AGRICULTURE.

PAINT FOR BRICK HOUSES. A correspondent of the Ohio Farmer has used a cheap and dorable paint for the exterior of brick dwellings, which has already stood several years, and is now quite as fresh as when first applied. It consists simply of whitewash, with sulphate of zink as a fixing ingredient. Any requisite shade is given by adding the colors used by house-A clear and rich crears color may painters. be obtained by applying yellow ochre to the common new brick; a livelier and warmer shade will be added by a little Venetian red. Burnt sienna may likewise be used. This paint is far cheaper than oil paint, costs but little more than common whitewash, and nothing will remove it but the severest friction.

CHURNING.

Butter should always be churned in a room or appartment, the temperature of which is between thirty and sixty degrees. At sixty degrees, butter is obtained in the greatest quantity and at about lifty two of the highest practical importance. A thermometer should always be suspended in the dairy or milk room, and all the operations regulated by it.

IMPROVEMENTS IN BUTTER FIRKINS.

Butter firkins, as at present constituted, require to be sawn horizontally through the centre, or the head removed in o der to obtain the butter, which is liable to be in jured from the consequent exposure to the air. As an improvement on the above, a new method has been invented by Daniel Minthron, of watertown, N. Y., who has taken measures to secure a patent. The firkin is made to consist of two parts, which are connected together by means of a taper flange on the core of the one, which fits into a corresponding recess cut into the edge of the other, the two parts being kept firmly together with hooks or any other suitable fastening. The great advantage of a fickin of this discription is, that small quantities of butter can be taken out when required, and the firkin afterwards closed airtight which renders it superior to those of the ordinary constructions for family use ; moreover the firkin can be used repeatedly for the purpose until completely worn out

KEEPING OF BUTTER.

There is a very common mistake in Scotland made in keeping sweet butter-viz., in water. This very quickly injures the fla-vour of it, making it tasteless and insipid. It should be kept in a cool airy place, but perfectly dry. The making up of butter perfectly dry.
