

SUNDAY'S MAIL.

The papers by this mail do not furnish anything of importance. We copy a few extracts below.

MEXICO.

The Nueces (Texas) Gazette, publishes a letter dated Brownsville Dec. 23, which says that the revolution raging in Mexico, has been proclaimed at Monterey, and it is rumored that Caravajal is there. Col. Montero, of the Mex can army, was captured by him. Gen Canales escaped when Gen. Cardenas was arrested, but is reported to have been since murdered by some Rancheros.

Gen. Morett has got up a pronunciamento and was marching on Zacatecas. The regular forces had again been defeated by a revolted portion of the National Guards, and had returned to Matamoros badly cut up.

WEST INDIES.

From Bermuda.—The arrival of the mail steamer at Halifax has put us in possession of Bermuda papers to the 25th ult. On the 23d a gale was experienced at Hamilton, which drove two or three vessels from their anchorage, unseated a few houses, uprooted several valuable fruit trees, and injured the young potatoes and other growing crops.

The Heron family were drawing full houses.

The Advertiser of the 25th says.—The Petrel arrived yesterday from St. Thomas, with large files of West India Papers. It is lamentable to read the record of the many and valuable and notable lives which have fallen by the scourging ravages of the Fever throughout the Antilles.

By Nassau papers, 47 deaths by Fever, had occurred from the 12th to the 19th Dec. and about one eighth of the population of New Providence have been taken away by the sickness.

UNITED STATES.

Reciprocity.—The New York Journal of Commerce says, it appears that a treaty of reciprocity between the United States and the British North American Provinces, has not only been concluded between the British Minister at Washington, and the United States Secretary of the Treasury, but ratified on the part of the British Government. In that shape it was returned to the American Government by the last British steamer from Liverpool, which explains the cause of her detention. The fisheries are embraced in the stipulations of the treaty, but precisely what are its provisions, we are not informed.

The objects of this arrangement are unquestionably good, and being an approximation towards free trade, its results will be good, if the basis of the arrangement are mutually just and equal.

If the United States Senate should concur in the ratification, an act of Congress will still be necessary, in order to carry into effect such parts of the treaty as refer to revenue.

CANADA.

A Railway Suspension Bridge over the St. Lawrence, near Quebec, to be constructed of Wire, is among the improvements talked of in that city. Three sites have been surveyed—one near Chaudiere which will require a Bridge of three thousand feet.—The plan proposed, says our Quebec contemporary the Chronicle, 'consisting of two massive towers of masonry, built in the river in twelve feet deep of water at average low tide, these towers to be in total height from their base, about 330 feet, and fifty two by one hundred and thirty-seven feet square at the base, tapering regularly upwards; and will they be 1610 feet apart at their centre. The height of the roadway above high water is to be 192 feet; the roadway will consist of two carriage ways each ten and a half feet wide in the clear, and a railway track of such width or gauge as to match the railways which may connect with it; the entire width of the road being 32 feet in the clear inside the parapet. It is estimated at £795, 317 10s. 1d, which may be paid for in only twenty years.

A despatch from Buffalo states that a destructive fire occurred in Brockport, Canada, on the morning of the 1st inst, consuming the American hotel, the bank, telegraph office, ten business establishments, and many offices and other apartments. Loss estimated at \$30,000.

NOVA SCOTIA.

Chebuco at Australia.—We are happy to announce the safe arrival in Australia, of the ship Chebuco which sailed from this port in July last, She made the run in 97 days. No letters have been received from any of her passengers.—Halifax British North American.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY

The following were adopted as standing Rules in the Session of 1851:— 37th.—That no Bill of a private nature, or Petition for money or relief, shall be received by the House after the fourteenth day from the opening of the Session, both inclusive; and that the Clerk of this House do, one month previous to the meeting of the Legislature, cause fifty printed copies of this Rule to be sent to each of the Clerks of the Peace in the several Counties for distribution; and cause the same to be inserted in the Royal Gazette, and two Newspapers in such County where Newspapers are published.

38th.—That this House will sustain no application for allowances to Teachers of Common or Parish Schools, unless it shall be certified by at least two Trustees of Schools for the Parish where such School has been taught, shewing the time actually taught—the Teacher to be licensed—the cause why such Teacher was not certified to the Sessions in the ordinary way—and that such Teacher was not compelled to discontinue his or her School on account of any improper conduct.
