Amherst is a remarkably healthy locality, and possesses peculiar advantages for children of delicate constitutions. RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR PLOUGHING MATCH.

1st Teams must be on the ground by Nine, and ready to commence work by Ten o'clock, A. M.

2nd All persons who have won the first prize two years shall not be deemed eligible to compete this year.

3rd Three Judges, shall be appointed by the Board, and their names shall be announced by the Secretary, on the morning of competition.

4th The Society will provide for the Ferrriage of all Horses, that have been actually engaged in the competition of the day.

5th The size of the furrow, to be 8 inches by 4 1/2 inches; or as near thereto as Ploughmen can approximate. The size of the furrow, shall be a consideration of merit with the Judges.

CATTLE SHOW.

RULES AND REGULATIONS.

1st All Horses and Cattle must be on the ground and ready to be entered for competition by 11 o'clock A. M., after 12 o'clock none will be admitted.

2nd To render any animal admissible for competition by a member of the society, it is only necessary that the exhibitor be prepared to prove by certificate, that he is the owner of such animal, and its breed and age.

3rd Three Judges will be appointed, whose names shall be announced by the Secretary on the morning of the show.

4th The decision of any two of the Judges shall be final. But except in the case of Entire Horses and Bulls, the Judges shall not withhold any premium or prize, on the ground that the animal exhibited was not worthy of it.

5th The Ferrriage of Cattle and Horses, entered for competition having crossed the River, will be provided for by the society.
