Edmonstone, Allen & Co., consisting of five first class vessels, will be on the route in June next, and that the Canada Ocean Steamship Co. will have two boats in readiness in the spring.

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 16.—The Pope's Nuncio.—There is an immense procession passing through the streets this evening, with an effigy of Mons. Bedini, who is believed to be in the city.

Extensive beds of porcelain clay have been discovered near Aiken, Georgia.

NEW YORK, Jan. 19.—Fire in the City Building.—The new City Hall fronting on Chambers street, was destroyed by fire between 5 and 6 o'clock this evening. The building was occupied by the United States Court, the Supreme Court and the Superior Courts, the Tax Commissioners, Emigration Commissioners, City Coroners, City Inspectors, Tax Warden, Commissioners of Streets and Lamps, and various important city offices. Nearly all the books records and important documents were saved. The law library containing books to the value of \$75,000, was in part of the building. Most of the books were saved, many in a damaged condition. The library was insured for \$20,000. Loss on library about \$10,000. The loss of the building is about \$50,000; on its contents 25,000. The building was formerly the old Alms House, but was remodelled and repaired several years ago for its recent use. It was built of brick, three stories in height and nearly 300 feet in length. No insurance on it.

CHOLERA AT SEA.—The ship Continent, which arrived at New York on Saturday morning from Liverpool, had fifty-four deaths by cholera during the passage. When she left Liverpool she had on board 490 passengers.

NEW BRUNSWICK.

It is stated that Col. Sloo has effected a contract with the firm of Sykes & Co., of England for the construction of a plank road across the Isthmus of Tehuantepec, under the Sloo grant, and every preparation made for the commencement of the work.
