

also been painted with a skull and cross bones and other devices intended to be used in the contemplated procession.

New York Jan. 23.—The papal Nuncio has no longer, in the United States a city that will give him a peaceful shelter. Everywhere he is burnt in effigy, hung in effigy as the hangman of Humanity. On Saturday there was a great rush of people to the steamer's dock to pay their respects to the notorious man-skinner, there being some 5,000 present, who crowded the wharves and roofs of the neighboring buildings. He did not make his appearance however, and it is supposed he took passage very early in the morning. There was a rumor also that he had left for Boston, which is not probable, as he has not since been heard of. There will probably be serious disturbances should he appear publicly in New York.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 18.—The Mexican Ocean Mail company have laid before Congress a statement of their plans and objects, from which it appears that they will soon be prepared to transport mails and passengers in sixteen or eighteen days from New York to San Francisco, by the way of their overland route from Vera Cruz to Acapulco. Passengers from New Orleans will be taken through in about fifteen days. If this company should carry an independent mail they will prove to the present mail contractors on this route a sinecure, and reduce the postage receipts to a nominal sum. They will probably take the British Australian Mail.

EFFECTS OF THE STORM.—The Barnstable Patriot thus describes some of the effects of the late disastrous storm:—

"Among the many scenes of destruction we have witnessed none more horrible than that near Highland, Light in Truro, and for about two miles between that place and Provincetown. Five vessels were wrecked upon the coast; and after the gale, hundreds of barrels of flour and mackerel, as well as corn, oats, coal, lumber, spars and almost every species of goods, were distributed upon the shore, in indiscriminate confusion and destruction. At least one hundred horses were employed on Tuesday last in carting these goods over to the inside of the harbour at Provincetown to be re-shipped for Boston and other places."

HONORS TO THE CAPTAIN OF THE THREE BELLS.—New York Jan. 26.—This morning the freedom of the city, together with a gold snuff box was presented to Capt. Creighton, of the Three Bells, at the Astor House. Afterwards the Captain proceeded with the Committee to the Governor's Room, in the City Hall, where he was greeted by an immense throng of our citizens with enthusiastic acclamations. Among the distinguished persons present were General Scott and staff.

FRIGHTFUL ACCIDENT.—New York, Jan. 26.—This morning the roof of a large iron building being erected at Fordham for an iron foundry, fell in, crushing the men at work. One was taken out dead, and six others frightfully wounded.

ERIE, Jan. 26.—It is understood that a despatch has been received by the U. S. Marshal, from Attorney General Cushing, instructing him to proceed immediately with the repairs of the railroad, and to forward word instantly to Washington if he is interfered with, in which case troops will be sent on without delay. Judge Thompson is endeavouring to allay the excitement among the people.

INTERESTING FROM ST. DOMINGO.—New York, Jan. 26.—Capt. Dumas, of the brig Eva, from St. Domingo, states that when he left, on the 8th inst., great excitement prevailed throughout the country, caused by an expected invasion by the Emperor Soloque.

#### NEW BRUNSWICK.

THE STEAMERS.—It is stated in American papers that a new Steamer will be placed on the line between Portland and St. John next season.

Efforts are also been made in this city and in Westmoreland County to procure Stock for a first class iron Steamer, to run between this port and the head of the Bay of Fundy, which it is expected will cost about £13,000. A substantial and speedy vessel on this route is much, and we trust the project will be forthwith accomplished. There cannot be the least doubt but it will pay well.—St John Chronicle.

IMPORTS.—The value in Sterling of goods imported into the Port of St. John alone, during last year, was as follows:—From Britain, £658,185; from the United States, £510,931; from all other places, £212,722—making altogether the sum of £1,381,838. This is the estimated value in Sterling money, as appears by the Custom House returns; but it is well known that these values are generally entered at what the goods cost in the place from whence they came, and much below their value, in this country, after freight and insurance has been added to them, so that we may safely put the real value of the goods imported into St. John, at something near £2,000,000 currency.

The estimated value of Dry Goods imported from Great Britain, in 1853, was £347,694 Sterling; iron, £88,123 Cordage £51,453; Hardware £34,631; Canvas, £21,

602; Copper and Yellow Metal, £17,272.—These appear to be the heaviest articles of import from the United Kingdom. The following quantity of Spirits were legally imported into this port, from all places, during last year, viz. 256,514 gallons—this does not include a large quantity of Yankee rum that was illegally imported, neither does it include Wine, of which there was a considerable quantity—the most of the Spirits legally imported consisted of Brandy. The number of barrels of Flour was 114,120; Corn Meal and Rye Flour, 15,774 barrels; Wheat, 176,286 bushels; Indian Corn, 83,368 bushels—the principal part of those articles were imported from the United States. Oats and Barley, 182,200 bushels—the most of this was imported from Prince Edward Island. Tea 722,249 pounds weight; Sugar 41,111 cwt.,—these two last named articles were imported from different countries.—All the above items are for this port, and do not include the Out-Bays.—St. John Courier.
