DEATHS AT THE ALMS HOUSE.—From the 28th of July to the 12th August, at noon there were 46 cases of cholera at the Alms House, 27 of which proved fatal. During same period there were five deaths from other diseases.

On Tuesday morning the Keeper reported that there had been 4 deaths from Cholera since Saturday at noon. No new cases on Tuesday morning. Number of inmates, 147.

The returns on Friday evening, gave a total of 49 cases of cholera, and 31 deaths.—*Morning News.*

WEST INDIES.

Later from Havana.—The steamship Cahawba, arrived from Havana on the 12th inst., at New York.

Upwards of one thousand free negroes had embarked in the British mail steamer Solent for England, en route for Africa.

Two officers were in Havana recruiting discharged Spanish soldiers for an imperial guard for Santa Anna.

The exports of Sugar to the 31st July exceeded those of the same period in 1852.

One hundred and seventy three soldiers arrived from Spain in a merchant vessel on the 9th.

Large numbers of negroes have been recently captured, and the Captain General was evidently using every effort to suppress the slave trade.

UNITED STATES.

Riot at St. Louis.—A telegraphic despatch from St. Louis, dated on the 9th August, states, that a riot occurred in that city about five in the afternoon. It appears that during an altercation at the 5th ward polls, an American was stabbed by an Irishman. A general attack ensued, in which pistols were fired, and stones and other missiles freely used. The mob supplied themselves with axes, and smashed every thing that would yield to blows; the furniture and other contents of a large number of drinking houses, were destroyed. The Irish College was threatened, and the German paper, the Anzeiger, had been attacked and was still threatened; eight military companies were marching towards that office, and others were already formed in line to protect it. About sixty houses, principally Irish groceries of the lowest character, had been destroyed; on Morgan street not a single house of this kind was left. Two arrests had been made; five persons were said to have been killed and a large number wounded.

Later.—Besides the destruction of some fifty or sixty houses, the telegraph states, that ten individuals have been killed, and several of the wounded are not expected to recover. The Mayor issued a proclamation, calling on the citizens to aid him in quelling the riot, and it was promptly responded to. He also issued a proclamation notifying parents and guardians to keep all minors under their control, in the house after seven o'clock in the evening, or they would be put in jail.

Cincinnati, August 14.—The Powder Magazine at Maysville, was fired by some miscreant, at two o'clock yesterday morning. The explosion was terrific, the magazine containing 800 kegs gunpowder. Thirteen houses were buried, but singular to say, not a life was lost by the actual explosion, and but few persons injured. One lady has since died from the effects of the fright. The citizens were so much alarmed that some minutes elapsed before any would venture into the streets, the general impression being, that the day of judgment had arrived; when they did go out they found the streets covered with fragments of demolished houses, &c. The damage done to property is between \$50,000 and \$100,000. The Mayor has offered a reward of \$1,000 for information that will lead to the conviction of the rascal that set fire to the magazine.

A tremendous fire occurred at New Orleans

on the 5th inst. Twenty large Stores were entirely consumed, and a vast amount of valuable property was burned. A second conflagration took place on the 10th, loss estimated \$1,600,000. Three lives were also lost. There had been 17 deaths from yellow fever during the week.

FROM TEXAS.—New Orleans papers have news from Texas. Its interest centres in the murders which are perpetrated in the most cold blooded manner in all parts of the State. The particulars in each case would be of but little interest to our readers.

THE ST. LOUIS RIOT.—Some idea of the extent of the riot at St. Louis may be formed from the fact that fifty-five houses were mobbed and the most of their contents destroyed. In addition to this, a large number of houses had windows broken, signs pulled down, and the inmates frightened away.

FEARFUL MORTALITY.—At Lamar's stage station, about fifteen miles from Chicago, there has been fearful mortality recently.—Of twenty five persons who dined there on Monday, seventeen died in the course of a few days, and the rest will probably die.—The cause for this mortality was found in the cellar. The bottom was covered with water in a putrid condition in which were floating out pieces of meat, decayed vegetables, and other refuse. Over this mass the meat consumed by the family was hanging, and through the accumulations upon it the disease—Whatever it may have been—is supposed to have been communicated to the sufferers.

THE STEAMSHIP FRANKLIN.—One of the reporters of the N. Y. Courier writes that all the cargo of the steamship Franklin has been removed—about two thirds of it in a sound condition, the remainder in a bad condition. The reporter thinks there is not the slightest chance of saving the steamer, although efforts continue for that purpose. He adds the following:—

“Two of the hands employed in diving for the cargo were attacked with cholera—one a man of herculean frame. Whilst I was there, his moans, when doubled up and his feet contracted by the cramp, were horribly. In both cases Capt. J. Q. Bownes—the able and indefatigable agent of the underwriters, gave the following: 1 tablespoon of salt, 1 teaspoonful of cayenne pepper, half pint of hot water. The man I saw was as bad as he could be. We put his legs in a strong mustard bath gave him the above and in two hours he was easy and wanted to go to work.”

THE CHOLERA ABROAD.—New York.—Cholera broke out at Blackwell's Island about ten days ago, with great virulence. Since that there have been 50 cases and 20 deaths; the fatal cases are confined to the lunatics. In the Alms House also, malignant cholera broke out on Monday, and since then there have been 30 cases and 15 deaths. The persons first attacked were at work on the premises.

The Evening Post notice the peculiarities presented by the progress of this mysterious disease on the Island. It first attacks the lunatics, who are better fed, and as a general thing much healthier than the convicts. The latter are made up of the lowest and most debauched of the community. Drunkards of the most depraved character, and woman worse than it seems possible for woman to be, constitutes the largest part of their numbers.

NOVA SCOTIA.

FIRE.—Just as the eleven o'clock bell was ceased ringing on Sabbath morning, and the different congregations were comfortably seated, the fire bell in the North End sounded an alarm, the roof of a house in Maitland street occupied by one Provov, being on fire. Number four Engine was soon on the spot, and the fire extinguished without much damage.

No sooner was this quenched, than the fire bells at the Union Engine house struck up, and on proceeding to the spot we found the top of Government House enveloped in a sheet of fire. In a short time the Engines were on the spot, the Military and a large concourse of citizens, assisting in extinguishing the fire. All the furniture was carefully removed across the road to the old burial ground, and every exertion made to save the moveable property. The centre roof of the building is completely destroyed; the wings, north and south were protected by the slating on the roof.—The ceiling, &c., are much injured. The amount required to repair the damage is supposed to be over two thousand pounds. The burning cinders were scattered about by the wind, and lodged on the roof of a carpenters shop in Irish town, also on the roof of the officers' barracks, where they ignited, but with a little exertion were prevented from doing injury. The fire had its origin in a defective chimney.

His Excellency Sir Gaspard Le Marchant was from home on a tour through our Province. His Lady and family are residing at the “Waverly.” It is supposed the Commissioners' House in the Dockyard will be offered them.

The quiet of the city was again disturbed

on Monday night, about the hour of ten o'clock. It turned out to be at a house near Woodhill's slaughter house, the roof of which had caught fire by a spark from the chimney. A few buckets of water soon stopped its further progress.
