

## HEALTH OF HALIFAX.

It has been currently reported that the Cholera has made its appearance in Halifax. We see no mention made of this in the papers. From the latest Novascotian received, we clip the annexed paragraph.

"We can easily understand the cause of the excitement in our community, for no doubt there are many who still remember the havoc this awful scourge made, when it visited our city in 1834, and at the same time, the dreadful accounts received from time to time, during the past summer, of its mortality in some of the West India Islands. We have, however, much pleasure in assuring the inhabitants of this city, that every precaution has been taken both by the Civil Authorities and the Executive of the Province, to guard against a visitation of the epidemic. For weeks past there have been frequent meetings of the Board of Health, additional Health Inspectors have been appointed, the sewers have been washed with water from the tanks and lime placed in them; and in fact, we think the city at present, as regards general cleanliness, will bear comparison with any other."

## TRADE OF ST. JOHN.

THE Courier furnishes the following report of the value of the Goods for the last half year, imported into this port.

"Last week we published the value of Dry Goods and Haberdashery imported into this port from Great Britain during the half year ending the 5th July last, and we are now enabled to lay before our readers the total value in sterling, of all goods imported into this port from every country, during the same period, which is as follows, viz:—£881,765. This shows a great increase over the value of the imports of the corresponding half year of 1853, which was £613,631. The increase amounts to £268,134 sterling."

EUROPEAN NEWS.

St. John August 22.

Health of city decidedly improving, only 7 deaths in the City in 48 hours since Saturday, and 9 in Portland, some of the latter, children, (and one, the first, a man that was taken up drunk the previous night.)

The Baltic arrived at New York at 4 o'clock P. M.

Markets.—Wheat advanced 2d. per 70lbs. Flour, solid demand moderated. Corn is dearer in consequence of potatoe blight.

It is stated that an Anglo French Expedition to the Crimea, is hovering on the coast, but no account of landing received.

From the Baltic, accounts received. Capture of Aland, August 3, and occupation by French. Denmark joined Austria and Prussian league.

Bucharest abandoned by the Russians and occupied by Omar Pacha.

English and French Ambassadors formally notified Austria that the last Russian propositions were rejected.

All quiet in Spain, Concha appointed governor of Cuba.

Consols 92½ to 92¾.

St. John, August 24.

New York, August 24.—Asia arrived today.

Russia consents to evacuate Moldavia, and the advance of Austrians is countermanded.

French troops have landed in the Crimea, also on Aland.

80,000 Turks have entered Wallachia.

Selim at the mouth of the Danube taken and burnt by the English.

King of Saxony killed by a fall from his carriage, his brother succeeds to the Crown.

Spain tolerably quiet.

Steamer Ottawa arrived at Liverpool on the morning of the 11th.

The English Government have chartered ships to convey arms, stores, &c. for the protection of Halifax, Quebec, Montreal, St. John, and the West India Islands.

## GAOL REGULATIONS.

At a General Session of the Peace, of our Lady the Queen, held at the Court House, Newcastle, in and for the County of Northumberland, on Tuesday, the Eleventh day of July, in the year of our Lord One Thousand Eight Hundred and Fifty Four.

Ordered, that the following Rules and Regulations be made and established in pursuance of the authority vested in the General Sessions, by Act of Assembly, 13 Viet., Cap. 30. "For the Regulation and management of Gaols and Work Houses."

I. The Gaoler to inspect the Cells once in the twenty-four hours.

II. Debtors to be kept apart from prisoners, charged with criminal offences.

III. The Gaoler to keep a record of all parties committed, whether for debt or charge of offence, to be laid before the General Sessions, if required.

IV. Every prisoner maintained at the public expense, shall be allowed a sufficient quantity of wholesome food, to be regulated by the General Sessions.

V. Prisoners, whether confined for debt, or before trial for any supposed offence, shall be allowed to procure for themselves, and receive at proper times, any food, bedding, cloths, or such other necessities as may be sanctioned by the Gaol Committee.

VI. No person who is confined under Sentence of any Court, nor any prisoner confined in pursuance of a Conviction, before a Justice, shall receive any other food than the Gaol allowance, except under special circumstances, such as sickness, &c.

VII. Prisoners behaving riotously or disorderly in the Gaol, to be put on half allowance of food.

VIII. The Gaol shall be provided with suitable bedding, and not more than two persons to sleep on one stretcher.

IX. The friends of prisoners for debt, may visit them as reasonable and proper hours of the day, compatible with security. Prisoners committed for felony or misdemeanour, may be visited by their friends, by permission of the Gaol committee, in presence of the Gaoler.

X. The walls of the cells to be whitewashed at least twice in the year, and the floors washed once a week, if there be any prisoners confined; an adequate allowance of water and soap, with towels, to be allowed prisoners.

XI. No intoxicating liquors to be allowed in the Gaol, for the use of prisoners, unless in case of sickness.

XII. No gaming to be allowed, and lights in the cells to be extinguished at ten o'clock in the evening.

XIII. In case of alarming sickness or serious accident to any prisoner, the gaol committee may call in a Surgeon, if they think it necessary.
