## EUROPEAN NEWS.

THE steamer Niagara arrived at Halifax on the morning of Wednesday, and our mail was received here yesterday afternoon.

The papers are to the 14th of the month, and we have devoted much space to the important news obtained from the seat of war.

The Commercial intelligence is not very favorable. Several failures were reported, and fears were entertained that others would soon follow. The following paragraph, copied from the latest number of Wilmer & Smith's paper, will be read with interest:

"The estate of Mr. Edward Oliver will be wound up under the inspection of the trustees, Daniel Campbell, Robert Rankin, Robert Crosby, John S. DeWolf, and W. J. Fernie, Esqs.; and the creditors have every expectation of eventually receiving the full amount of their claims. It is stated that, under the arrangement of the affairs, the principal firm interested have agreed to take back vessels which have been sold to him on credit to the amount of £400,000, and that his acceptance to that extent will, therefore, be cancelled. The city article of the Times of yesterday has the following:—

"No further intelligence of a definite character has been received in relation to the commercial difficulties at Liverpool, but it seems to be greatly doubted if the arrangement lately stated to have been arrived at with regard to the affairs of Mr. Edward Oliver, can be carried out. In the case of Messrs. Jas. McHenry & Co., who failed on the 5th instant, it is reported that the liabilities amounted to £500,000, and that the prospects of the creditors are extremely favorable." The following extract from a letter from Mr. Oliver was received by his correspondent and published in the Cork Examiner:—"You will no doubt have heard of my temporary embarrassment, but I am happy to say that all is now amicably and peacefully arranged. My estate is vested in trustees, to be worked by myself, and shows at present a surplus over my liabilities of about £400,000." The Limerick Chronicle announces:—"That one respectable house there in the breadstuff trade, has been compelled to cease business altogether, having been involved by McHenry & Co. of Liverpool. Another called a meeting of creditors, and engaged to pay all demands in full upon a most satisfactory proof of assets."

The following is an extract from their Monetary and Commercial Review

"The Saldanha, from Melbourne, with gold to the value of £130,000, was off this port this evening. Her advices have been anticipated.—The Queen of the South (ss) arrived at Southampton to-day, with £350,000 in dust and sovereigns. The Golden Era, and Guiding Star, ships, both left Melbourne for this port in the month of July, with gold to the extent of nearly half a million sterling, both of which may be expected to arrive in a week or two. The Revenue returns for the year and quarter ending the 5th instant have been presented this week to the public, in a new and more simplified form—and afford ample proof of the satisfactory progress of the commerce of the country—exhibiting a net increase on the quarter of £550,188, on the year of £16,580. During the quarter the returns under the head of Excise, Stamps, Property Tax, Post-office, and Crown Lands, show an increase, amounting in the aggregate to £1,056,266, while a decrease appears in the Customs, Taxes, Miscellaneous, Imprest, and other moneys, and in the repayment of advances, to the extent of £508,078. For the year these departments showing improvement are Excise, Property-tax, Post-office, and impost and other moneys. These have increased to the amount of £1,803,827, while in the Customs, Stamps, Taxes, Crown Lands, Miscellaneous, and repayment of advances, there has been a decline of £1,787,274—making up the figures above quoted. The returns also show an increase of £77,897 for the last half year, when compared with the previous corresponding period.

"In the money market the recent failures in Liverpool and London have caused a feeling of caution on the part of bankers and money-lenders, which has led to considerable inconvenience, but in other respects the market may be considered easier—still long dated paper is difficult to negotiate. Parcels of gold continue to find their way into the Bank of England, the demand for exportation having almost entirely ceased."

## LIVERPOOL TIMBER MARKET.

We obtained by the mail a copy of A. F. & D. Mackay's Timber Circular of the 13th inst. We quote the following:

Yellow Pine Timber—Quebec, per cubic foot, 1s 3d to 1s 6d; St. John, 18 inches average 1s 7d; Miramichi 1s 2d to 1s 4d; Bay Chaleur 1s 2d to 1s 5d; Richibucto 1s 2d to 1s 3d.

Pine Timber.—The arrivals from Quebec continue large, the greater part of which is in first hands. When sales are made lower prices are accepted.

New Brunswick and Nova Scotia Pine and Spruce Deals.—Since our last lower prices have been current for this article. Two cargoes of St. Stephen's Deals have been sold at £8.15 per standard; Pugwash £8, and various parcels of lower ports at the same rates.

## SIR JOHN FRANKLIN.

The following was received by Telegraph at the St. John Reading Room.

Montreal, October 20.—A despatch from Dr. Roe, dated York Factory, August 4, has been received by Sir George Simpson, Governor of the Hudson Bay Territory, narrating the discovery of the remains of Sir John Franklin, and his unfortunate company. They were starved to death in the spring of 1850, to the north-west of Box River.

The courier of this despatch is very responsible.

## INQUEST.

AN Inquest was held at Tabusintac, on the 5th instant, before John McLeod, Esq., Coroner, on the body of Norman Campbell, of that place. He was drowned in Tabusintac River between the night of the 3rd and the morning of the 4th instant, being knocked overboard out of a boat by the jibing of the main boom.

Verdict—Accidental death.

## EUROPEAN NEWS.

St. John, October 26.

Niagara arrived at Halifax yesterday morning, 25th inst.

Sebastopol not yet taken. The place was completely invested on the south side. On the 2nd inst. Allies had destroyed Aqueduct, and cut off supplies of water from the city. Assault was expected to be made on the 8th. Allied trenches were within sixteen hundred yards of the walls.

Immediately after the battle of Alma Menschikoff sunk five of his line-of-battle ships and two frigates, thus completely blockading up the entrance of the harbour of Sebastopol. These ships were sunk with their guns and stores on board and rigging standing.

Allied Generals have changed their place of operation and intend to attack the south instead of the north side of the city.

A letter in the Times suggests, that the powerful iron steamer Simoon should be employed as a steam battering ram to force a passage over the sunken ships.

All the Allied reserves had left Varna for the Crimea.

Russians reported to have blown up the fortresses at Anapa and Sauchoum Kale, and sent garrison of fifteen thousand to reinforce Menschikoff.

Paris Debates estimate Russian force in Crimea at 85,000 and Allies at 95,000 including seamen.

The Turks bayoneted all the wounded Russians calling to them Sinope.

On the death of St. Arnaud, Lord Raglan took chief command of the Allied army. St. Arnaud died of disease of the heart.

French Fleet in Kiel harbour on the 7th. The greater part of the fleet under Admirals Napier and Martinvere at anchor off Revel.

Schamyl has been defeated by Prince Andronskoff, who again threatens Kars.

France.—The recent Mammoth lie of the fall of Sebastopol, has been traced to Paris Bourse. The Emperor has ordered investigation, and says he will punish with severity whoever is found guilty.

Liverpool.—Breadstuffs very firm at an advance of 1s 8d on flour, and 4d on wheat.
