REGULATIONS.

FOR TAVERNS AND SALE OF SPIRITUOUS LIQUORS.

At a General Session of the Peace of Our Lady the Queen, held at the Court House, in Newcastle, in and for the County of Northumberland, on Tuesday, the Eleventh day of July, in the year of Our Lord One Thousand Eight Hundred and Fifty Four.

Ordered, that the following Rules and Regulations be made and established in pursuance of the Authority Vested in the General Sessions by Act of Assembly, 17 Vict., Cap. 14, Sec. 7, of an Act Intituled "an Act to regulate the Sale of Spirituous Liquors."

I. That every Tavern Keeper, shall have at least four Bed Rooms, with at least one clean Bed and Bedding in each, and one Spare Room for the exclusive accommodation of Travellers; and shall at all times be provided with Ginger Beer, Spruce Beer or Lemon Syrup, Malt Liquors, Tea and Coffee, and in all other respects furnished with the necessary means for the refreshment, accommodation and comfort of Travellers and others, under a Penalty of One Pound, for each and every offence.

II. That every Tavern Keeper shall keep good Stabling and Hay, Oats, Oat Meal and Indian Meal, for at least four teams of Horses or Oxen, exclusively, for their use; it shall also be the duty of the Tavern Keeper to attend in person, or have a faithful servant at all times in attendance, to take charge of any Horse or Horses or other animals, and it shall further be the duty of the Tavern Keeper to see that any Horse, Horses, or other animals left in their custody, be properly cleaned, fed, watered and other wise taken care of, when so ordered by the person owning or using the same, or when any such Horse, Horses, or other animals shall remain the same, under a Penalty of Two Pounds, for each and every offence.

III. It shall be the duty of every Tavern Keeper to pay proper attention at all times, to the wants of Travellers, and to take charge of the Horses, Carriages, Sleds, Carts, Baggage and Goods of such Travellers, and to provide sufficient Yard Room or other enclosed or secure places, to put in loaded teams, so as to protect such from injury or intrusion, and to see that the property of Travellers suffer no loss or damage whilst in their custody, by the negligence or carelessness of themselves or their servants, under a Penalty of Two Pounds, for each and every offence, in addition to which, should any such loss happen, it shall be the duty of such Tavern Keeper to make good the same.

IV. That no unlawful game or games, shall be played or permitted or suffered in any Tavern, or in any Out House, Yard, Garden or Premises fore or to be longed, nor shall any drunkenness or other disorderly conduct be suffered in any Tavern, or in any part of the premises belonging thereto, but good Order and Rule be maintained and kept therein according to the above recited Act and of these Regulations, under a Penalty of Five Pounds, for each and every offence.

V. That all Tavern Keepers shall close their doors (except to Travellers who are to be admitted at all hours), at ten o'clock in the evening of each week or laboring day, and shall not suffer any idle or disorderly person to remain drinking or tipping in their respective Houses, under a Penalty of One Pound, for each and every offence.

VI. That no Tavern Keeper, or Wholesale Dealer shall upon any pretence whatever, sell any Spirituous Liquors, to any person in a state of drunkenness or intoxication, or apparently intoxicated; nor to any woman of intemperate habits, or children, whose parents or guardians are known or reported to be intemperate, or allow any drunken or intoxicated person, to drink any Liquor, within, or about his premises, under a Penalty of Two Pounds, for each and every offence.

VII. That no Tavern Keeper shall open, or keep open his Bar or Bar Room, on Sunday; nor shall suffer any idle or disorderly person, to loiter about his premises on that day, under a Penalty of Three Pounds, for each and every offence.

VIII. That every Tavern Keeper, shall at all reasonable times, in the day time, exhibit or present to the view of any Justice of the Peace, Town Clerk of the Parish, for which the License is granted, or to such person as the Sessions may appoint, the nature and extent of his or her accommodation, under a Penalty of One Pound, for each and every offence.

IX. All Tavern Keepers are required to aid the Peace Officers, in the maintenance of Peace, to the utmost of their power, as well by their exertions and influence, as by exposing every wrong-doer and by furnishing names and assisting to arrest and expose any and every person who may be charged with any wrong or offence, in case of such person so charged, being in or about their respective premises, under a Penalty of One Pound, for each and every offence.

X. That all Wholesale Dealers, and Tavern Keepers, shall keep True and Lawful Measures for the Sale of Liquors, according to Law, under a Penalty of One Pound, for each and every offence.

XI. That every Tavern Keeper on receiving his License, shall receive from the Clerk of the Peace, a Copy of these Regulations (who is required to furnish the same), and have them posted up in some conspicuous place, in all his houses, and open to the inspection of Travellers, under a Penalty of One Pound, for each and every offence.

XII. That no Wholesale Dealer, or Tavern Keeper, shall mix or adulterate any Liquor whatever, or compound, or reduce the same, with deleterious ingredients; nor shall any Wholesale Dealer or Tavern Keeper sell, or expose, or offer for sale, any Liquors mixed or reduced as aforesaid, under any pretence, or for any purpose whatever, under a Penalty of Three Pounds, for each and every offence.

XIII. Every Wholesale Dealer, shall have painted on his "Wholesale Dealer," and every Tavern Keeper shall have painted "Licensed Tavern," over the door of the places respectively in which they are licensed to sell, with their names respectively thereon

under a Penalty of One Pound, for each and every offence.

XIV. A Breach of the foregoing Rules and Regulations, or any of them, by any member of the Family, or servant of any Wholesale Dealer, or Tavern Keeper, respectively, shall be deemed and taken to be a breach by such Wholesale Dealer, or Tavern Keeper himself, and he or she shall be liable therefor, and dealt with accordingly.
