Mr Cutler informed the House that His Excellency, in answer to the address of the House of the 24th inst., was pleased to say that he would give the necessary directions to have certain returns of the Clerk of the Peace, for the County of Kent, laid before the House.

From the Morning News.

February 28.

The first bill which occupied the attention of the House, was committed, on motion of Mr. Kerr. It had for its object to vest Portage Island in the Miramichi river in the Sessions of the County of Northumberland, as an Indian reserve. Progress reported.

The house then proceeded to order of the day, in further consideration of the Report of the Law Commission, a very long debate ensued, on the Chapter codifying the Municipal Election Act, an amendment had been submitted by the Law Commission.

Mr. Cutler made a regular attack on the Government. Mr. Connell also made certain charges, affecting the sincerity of the Government in regard to introduction of municipalities.—The Attorney General warmly refuted these charges, and the House adjourned at 5 o'clock, reporting progress, without coming to any decision on the amendment introduced by Mr. Needham.

News of the Week.

UNITED STATES.

STEAMSHIP AMERICA, FOR LIVERPOOL, DIRECT.—In consequence of the accident to steamship Africa, which will prevent her leaving New York next Wednesday, the agents of the Royal Mail Steamship Company have decided to despatch the steamship America from this port direct, on Thursday with the Mails.

The last accounts of the Africa still stuck in the mud at Bedlow's island. Her cargo, about 700 tons, had been taken out, but there were no hopes of getting her off until a higher course of tides. On Friday the steam tugs Leviathan and Titus made an ineffectual attempt to tow her off.—*Boston paper, Feb. 21.*

NEW YORK, Feb. 21.—The steamship Africa was got off this morning, and is now at anchor off Robbins' Reef.

The storm of last night was more severe here than for many years. In the streets in some spots the snow is a foot and a half deep. On the road to Philadelphia, at Burlington, N. J., the snow is five feet deep on the railroad tracks. At Philadelphia the snow is two feet deep on a level, and in some places six feet, and the trains all stopped for the last 24 hours.

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 23.—A letter from the Breakwater states that the storm of Monday night was more severe than any before known there, and was accompanied by thunder and lightning. The beach is strewn with wrecks. Thirteen vessels are ashore within sight of the Breakwater. Several vessels in our harbour were dismantled.

SEVERE STORM.—New York, Feb. 21.—The storm of last night was more severe than any known here for many years. In the streets in some spots the snow is a foot and a half deep. The Pilots on the Southern trains are not in. The Pilot on the Southern line from this City for Philadelphia, is blocked up at Burlington, N. J., where the snow is five feet deep.

At Philadelphia the snow is two feet deep on a level, and in some places six feet.

No trains had arrived there or departed since yesterday afternoon, up to 10 o'clock this morning.

Second Despatch.—The storm of last night caused no serious disaster in our harbor. The brig Wanderer, Chadwick, went ashore on Bedlow's Island, but will be got off to-day.

The Africa is now at her dock.

Baltimore, Feb. 21.—The snow lies two feet deep on a level, and the streets are badly blocked up by drifts. No trains from any quarter have arrived since yesterday, and none have left.

All the railroads in the vicinity are blocked up by immense drifts.

To-day the weather is clear and warm.
Later.—The Washington train arrived here at 10 o'clock to-day. The Philadelphia train,

due here at six o'clock last evening, is blocked up at Havre de Grace. Snow ploughs are now at work, but the track will hardly be cleared off before night.

NEW BRUNSWICK.

HANDSOME.—A purse of One Hundred Pounds, made up by several Merchants of the City, was presented on Monday to Mr Edward Sanction, as "a testimony of their approbation of the manner in which he had discharged his responsible duties at the Bank of British North America." Mr S. lately resigned his situation there, having been connected with the institution since its commencement in this City.—*St. John Chronicle.*

We understand that a Petition has been sent to the Legislature, from the County, containing 24,000 signatures, praying for the prohibition of Liquor being imported into the Province.

FROZEN TO DEATH.—On Wednesday morning last the body of a woman, named Mrs Dyzart, was found lying near Lorimer's Bakery establishment, Brussels Street. It seems her husband was in the habit of drinking, and they quarrelled very often and he turned her out of doors on Tuesday night, which was bitter cold. Coroner's Verdict—"Found Dead."—*Morning News.*

EMIGRANTS.—The number of Emigrants who arrived at this port in 1853, was 3337, at Miramichi 21, and at Shediac 46; making a total of 3404 for this port and outbays. The number arrived at St. John in 1852 was 2035. Courier.

COLD WEATHER.—Halifax harbour was frozen over on Monday night; the Dartmouth Steamer, however, forced a passage way on the following morning.—*Sun.*

NOVA SCOTIA.

The keels of several new vessels are about to be laid down on the shores of this harbour. It is said that Vice Admiral Seymour has been ordered home to take command of the Baltic fleet. The rumour requires confirmation.

Fuel is at an extraordinary price in Halifax, Wood 25s. per cord; Coal \$10 to \$11 per chaldron.

The Merlin arrived yesterday from Bermuda—having on board Sir G. F. Seymour, Lt. Fortescue, and other officers of the Cumberland. It is reported they will proceed to England in the Steamer—due on Thursday night.—*B. N. American.*
