

THE RECIPROCITY TREATY.

The New Brunswick furnishes us with the following important despatch from Washington:

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12.—The government has acceded to the application of Mr. Moses H. Perley, of New Brunswick, respecting the free admission of Colonial fish caught this season, and has given official assurance of an executive application to Congress for the refunding of any duties that may hereafter be paid on such fish, and for power to cancel any warehouse bonds that may be given henceforth until the reciprocity treaty shall come into full operation. This concession had been made in consideration of our fishermen having been promptly admitted to the in-shore fisheries of the Province, and to all the profits of the present fishing season.—Mr. Perley has managed his negotiations skillfully and successfully. He now goes to Quebec, other business connected with the treaty, which it is expected will finally be completed in a few weeks, satisfactory information having been received from New Brunswick and Nova Scotia.

PORT OF QUEBEC.

THE total number of square rigged vessels that arrived at this port up to the 30th ult., was 1,128, being an excess of 56 over the same period last year, the extra tonnage was 22,955. Total passengers—48,579, being an increase of 14,035 over last year.

EUROPEAN NEWS.

St. John, October 18.

New York, 16th October.—Baltic arrived. Great battle in the Crimea. Russians defeated. Sebastopol attacked and the city in flames. Russians loss 18,000 killed and wounded. 22,000 prisoners. Ten ships were sunk. English and French loss 10,000 killed. 100 Guns captured. Menschikoff with the remnant of the Russian force refuses to surrender.

Liverpool Markets.—Breadstuffs generally unchanged. Consols closed at 95½ to 95¾.

FURTHER PARTICULARS.

St. John, October 20.

Baltic at New York on the 16th. Great Battle on the 21st at Alma river, in the Crimea. After four hours fight, Allies stormed Russian entrenchments. Anglo-French had 2,800 killed and wounded; Russians 6,000. On the 23rd Russians under Menschikoff, personally rallied, were driven back to the entrenchments behind Sebastopol.—On the 24th again rallied, and fought third battle, and were again defeated, and fled into Sebastopol, which was beleaguered by sea and stormed by land. Russian fleet was burnt, and 10 ships of war sunk. Russians lost 18,000 killed and 22,000 capitulated and were made prisoners.

Menschikoff, with the shattered remnant, barricaded the inner harbour, and refused to surrender. Six hours were allowed him, and it is reported (but not officially) that he had surrendered.

An attack on Cronstadt is seriously menaced.

The latest despatch says—that Menschikoff has surrendered, and the British and French flags now wave our Sebastopol.

The entrenched camp of the Russians on the height of Alma, contain 50,000 men.—No general officers of the British were wounded. Marshal St. Arnaud and Lord Ragland commanden in person. French General Thomasson thought to be mortally wounded. Gen. Canrobert was wounded in the shoulder.

The return of the French fleet from the Baltic had been countermanded.

A despatch from Reil, dates 2nd, states that the fleet left that harbour to join Napier in the Baltic. Napier was before Revel on the 23rd.

Detail of Sebastopol news was not expected by the British Government before the 6th inst.

Six Russian ships escaped from Sebastopol.

Liverpool.—The very latest, October 4.—Disturbances had broken out at Burgos, Spain.

Nothing further with respect to the capture of Sebastopol, but previous accounts are confirmed.

The Turkish Ambassador presented to the London Times a copy of the despatch sent to him from Constantinople, and stated he entertained no doubt of the present published accounts.

Markets.—Breadstuffs unchanged, Western Canal Flour 31s. 4/10 Ohio 24s., Provisions unchanged, and moderate business doing.

SHEDIAC.—October 18. The trial of the first Engine, called the Hercules, built at the Boston Locomotive Works, for the E. & N. A. Railway Company, run by F. W. Cummings, of Boston, under command of Mr Lister, commanding Engineer, took place this day, and had proved highly satisfactory.—Rainy day, but crowds of persons were in attendance.

St. John, October 20.

Africa arrived at 4 o'clock this afternoon. News by Baltic was a stupendous Hoax. Sebastopol not taken. Reported destruction of Russian fleet and capture of fort Constantine, false.

Omar Pacha's despatch a forgery. The discovery of the falsity of the news has created an immense sensation throughout Europe.

Sebastopol is being formally invested by the Allies, and fighting continues daily. Liverpool Markets.—Western canal flour 32s, Ohio 29s, wheat firm; Consols 95½.
