ST. JOHN, October 18. New York, 16th October.—Baltic arrived. Great battle in the Crimea. Russians defeated. "Sebastopol attacked and the city in Russians loss 18,000 killed and wounded. 22,000 prisoners. Ten ships were sunk. English and French loss 10,000 killed. 100 Guns captured. Menschikoff with the remnant of the Russian force refuses to surrender.
