YESTERDAY'S MAIL.

This mail arrived last evening about half-past seven o'clock. The latest paper from St. John is dated on Saturday last. It furnishes us with but little news. We give below a few extracts.

CANADA.

The sum of \$5500 is acknowledged in the New York Albany, by the Committee for procuring subscriptions in the City of New York for the benefit of the widows and orphans of soldiers, seamen, and marines of the British service, employed in the war against Russia. Communication by Railway between Quebec and Montreal was opened on the 27th ult.

An Englishman named Sheppard, in the employ of the Grand Trunk Railway, was found murdered near Toronto, on Saturday night last. The following laborers, employed by the same Company, have been arrested on suspicion:—Wm. Crawley, John Mack, Edward Turney, Thomas Oaknuff, Mathew Henry, Mathew Glesor, James Cunningham, and John Crampton.

The Canadian Screw Steamers are among

those lately chartered by the Imperial Government to convey troops to the East. The former embarked troops at Cork; the latter at Portsmouth.

NOVA SCOTIA.

The Hon. Attorney General, asked leave to introduce a Bill for the purpose of giving effect on the part of the Province of Nova Scotia, to the Treaty lately ratified between Her Majesty's Government and the United States of America. This Bill has been framed modelled after the Bill passed by the other Colonies;—and the subject to which it refers have been so fully discussed, and is so well understood, that it is not incumbent on me at this stage to enter into any explanation of its nature.

It is supposed that the Legislature, after passing the Reciprocity Treaty, will adjourn over until after the Christmas and New Year Holidays.

Captain Daly, of Government schr. Daring, reports, that the ship Arcadia, of Warren, U. S., 715 tons, Captain Jordan, with a crew of 21 men, and 147 German passengers, and a cargo of lead, iron, glass, and other merchandise, 23 days from Antwerp, for New York, was wrecked on the S. E. side of N. E. Bar of that Island, at 6 P. M. on Sunday, 26th Nov. during a strong breeze from S. S. W., and thick fog. All the crew and passengers saved by the Island crew with one of Francis' Metallic Life Boats. The ship has become a total wreck, having filled soon after striking, and listed off shore so that the crew or passengers could save nothing but what was on them at the time, and are now in a most destitute condition, none of them having a change of clothing, and many of them not half dressed, being in bed at the time of the disaster.—Morning Journal.

NEW BRUNSWICK.

We have to congratulate our old friend, the Hon. Admiral Owen, now a resident in this City, on his promotion to be a Vice Admiral of the Blue. The official announcement of this intelligence, we understand, was received was received by the gallant Admiral on Monday last.—Courier.
