

land, and that thus before long the project will be realised. The company has been formed in New York. The lines run over land on Prince Edward's Island, and then under water to Newfoundland. If this under-water part works well, in all probability the attempt will be made to carry the line to Europe, where it must go before long.—N. Y. Express.

Washington letters in the New-York papers of Tuesday morning and evening, convey the intelligence that the American Minister to the Court of Her Britannic Majesty, Queen Victoria, had settled the basis of an important and favorable Convention, with Lord Aberdeen on behalf of their respective Governments by which England admits, in the approaching European war, the doctrine that the flag covers both ship and cargo, and that free ships make free goods; also renouncing the right of search for the impressment of seamen so far as American vessels are concerned, and conceding the restriction as to the law of blockade.

WEST INDIES.

CUBA.—Earthquake.—On the night of the 17th March, an earthquake was felt at Cuba during ten seconds, but although the inhabitants were greatly terrified no damage appears to have been done. Earthquakes were experienced in the same locality in 1852.

Jamaica.—Advices from Jamaica are to the 11th inst. The Cholera, we are glad to notice, had not made much progress on this, its second visit, to Jamaica; and for two or three days previously to the departure of the Mail there had been no new cases. A very flattering report of the operations of the Jamaica Copper Mining Company appears in the Kingston papers; the ore is said to be of very superior quality—samples of it had been sent to New York to be tested.

Antigua.—Dates from Antigua are to the 10th instant. There had been repeated attempts within the proceeding fortnight to fire the Town of St. John, which had caused much excitement in the community. The Assembly were discussing a measure to largely increase the Police Force, so as to ensure protection to property. The report that English Harbor, Antigua, was to become the coaling depot for the West India Steamers, in lieu of St. Thomas, was considered by the St. John's people to be "too good news to be true." Baron de Fleur was giving concerts at Antigua.

Trinidad.—Accounts to the 10th inst., from Trinidad state that the crop of sugar will reach 30,000 hogsheads, while the available tonnage to transport the crop to England could not convey more than 17,000 hogsheads: there was employment for 13,000 tons of shipping; but the Port of Spain Gazette says, "where the 13,000 tons are to be got from is a Mystery." Bermudian.

An attempt had been made at St. Domingo to assassinate the President; and a conspiracy had also been discovered to burn and destroy the town of St. Jago.

NEW BRUNSWICK.

A telegraph despatch from Washington says—"The British government has declared that the Anglo-French Alliance was not designed with any reference to Cuba or Mexican affairs, or any other on this hemisphere, except La Platte."

The European and North American Railway.—We never doubted the ability or the determination of Messrs. Jackson, Peto, Brassey & Co. to complete this great work according to the conditions of the contract. The following extract from a letter written by Mr. Jackson, and addressed to a gentleman in this city, has a decided tendency to strengthen the convictions we have so long entertained—

"It is well you caught me in 1853. We are in it, and will honorably carry through the undertaking, but if it were now we should shudder at the prospect."

The Russian ships in the United States ports have been laid up, the masters being afraid that they will be captured if they proceed to sea.

Steamship City of Glasgow.—The American papers express much anxiety in reference to this steamship, which is now considerably overdue.—New Brunswicker.

CANADA.

A GREAT LUMBERING ESTABLISHMENT.—The valley of the Ottawa river in Canada is noted for the extensive lumber operations which are carried on there, and the magnitude of the interests embarking in the trade. There is one firm alone which employs in the forests seventeen hundred horses and two hundred head of bullock, independent of 400 double teams which are constantly on the road engaged in the conveyance of food and forage. In the report of the engineer employed on the Montreal and Bytown railway, it is stated that this firm have at present 3500 men in their service, and one hundred lumbering establishments, scattered over several hundred miles of territory.

Their consumption of pork is ten thousand barrels annually; and their daily consumption of oats during the winter months, from one thousand to two hundred bushels. The firm is now constructing a saw mill at the Chats, on the Ottawa, which will saw fifteen million feet of boards annually, and their annual cash payments for keeping their immense establishment in motion exceeds \$2,000,000.
