GRECE.—Advises from Athens of the 30th ult., State that the rebels have been defeated at Calambac. Faud Effendi took Calambac by assault. Hadji Petros's band was dispersed. 1000 were killed, and many made prisoner. The Turks sent 600 heads of the slain to Larissa.

The ministry had shipped off the King's secretary. The revolt in Thessaly is completely at an end.

BY S. JOSAPHAT'S CONTINENTAL TELEGRAPH. Vienna July 6.—It is credibly stated here that the Emperor Francis Joseph himself will take the command of the troops in Hungary and Gallacia.

Paris, Friday July 7.—The Spanish Insurrection causes much uneasiness here. Nobody knows what General Narvaez will do. It is said he will join the Insurrectionists, should they get the upper hand.

POSTSCRIPT.

We stop the press to insert the following particulars of the recent fire in Fredericton, copied from the Head Quarters of Wednesday.

DESTRUCTIVE CONFLAGRATION.—On Monday night, about 11 o'clock, our city was again visited with one of those destructive conflagrations which, of late years, have been of very frequent occurrence. The fire originated in Mr Wiley's work shop, in the rear of his waterroom, on Queen street, communicating with Westmorland street, it next consumed the house owned by Hon. Charles Fisher, and occupied by Mr Barrett. It then passed along Westmorland street, on either hand, to Queen and King streets, and burnt on the corner of the former, the large store and dwelling-house owned and occupied by Mr Hale, and set on fire the buildings on the opposite block; and on the latter the corner house formerly owned by Mr W. Harit was soon enveloped in flames, which spread down King street, burning the houses owned and occupied by Messrs Burt and Wiley, and by great exertion was checked at the residence of Mr A. Phair, Postmaster, which was burnt to the ground.

In a few minutes the buildings on both sides of Queen street were being destroyed with the greatest rapidity; on the east side down to the building owned by Mr Clark, and on the west the entire block, including the buildings intervening between that and the river, Mr Coburn's store being the only exception.

Thus in about four hours forty-six dwelling houses and stores, besides a large number of out-buildings, were reduced to ashes. The wind was at first quite light, but the intense heat soon caused a very strong current from the south-west, which, fortunately for the rest of the city, drove the flames towards the river; otherwise it is impossible to say where they would have stopped. There had not been any rain for some time, consequently everything was in the most combustible state.
