

New Orleans papers of Tuesday have been received. The total number of deaths the previous week were 504, which 341 were from yellow fever.

At Savannah on Tuesday, there were three deaths by fever. The epidemic was decreasing; but the papers warn strangers to keep away from the city at present.

At Charleston, on Friday, six deaths from fever.

CANADA.

The Kingston (Canada News) learns from Three Rivers, that the party who left there some time since to prospect on the St. Maurice, have returned with the gratifying intelligence that the same stratification prevails as in California and report favourably of the mining capabilities of district of St. Francis.— They brought to Three Rivers a specimen of the St. Maurice gold dust, and the formation of a Company for mining purposes is spoken of.

NEW BRUNSWICK.

We learn from the Religious Intelligencer that the Free Baptist Meeting House at Jacksonton, Carleton County, was destroyed by fire on Sunday last.

A lad named Peck, 15 years of age, eldest son of Mr James Peck, was killed at Wickham, Q. C., a few days ago, by a horse running away and dragging the deceased along the road until life was extinct.

The price of breadstuffs is now so much lower in England than in America that several cargoes of flour are said to have been shipped from Liverpool for New York. This has not happened since the inflation of 1837, when flour was imported into New York from the Mediterranean.

CHURCH OF SCOTLAND.—The Rev. Wm. Donald has received by last Mail, (from Wm. Young, Esq., W. S. Edinburg, Secretary to the Church of Scotland's Colonial Committee, and Treasurer of the funds contributed by the Church in aid of the wives and families of the Soldiers and Sailors engaged in the Eastern war,) the following acknowledgement of the collection made for that purpose in St. Andrew's Church of this City:—

Edinburgh 13th Sept. 1854.—Received from the Rev. Wm. Donald, £35 2s. 2d. stg. (£79 11s. 7d. cy.) being a collection made in St. Andrew's Church N. B., in aid of the wives and children of Soldiers and Sailors engaged in the Eastern war.

In his letter to Mr Donald, Mr Young says, "It will be gratifying to you to know that the St. Andrew's Church collection is the largest I have received."

It will also be gratifying to the friends of the Church of Scotland in this Province to learn that Mr Young intimates to Mr Donald that the Colonial Committee has made two appointments of Missionaries to New Brunswick, namely the Rev. Robert Stephenson and the Rev. Peter Keay, and that Mr Stephenson is now on his way out by the Europa, which was to leave Liverpool on Saturday last.—New Brunswicker.

BURGLARS.—During the past week a number of the most daring burglaries have been committed. The first store broken into was we believe, M'Morran & Dunn's, in Water street. On Wednesday night the burglars visited Mr. Hunter's Wine and Spirit Store, in Mr. Chubb's building, effecting an entrance by a hatchway from the basement, and took some £4 or £5 in silver and drank three bottles of champagne. On Thursday night they entered the Grocery Stores of Mr. Hastings and Mr. Magee, in Dock Street. By means of a ladder they got in through the windows in the rear, approaching by way of Nelson street. Some iron bars that stood in their way were wrenched aside. When inside they rifled the drawers and helped themselves to what they wanted. They made desperate efforts to force open Mr. Magee's Safe with an iron bar, but did not succeed. On that night they also entered the Hardware Store of Mr. Black and that of Thorne & Lee on the North Wharf, forcing open the back doors. These Stores abut on those of Messrs. Hastings and Magee and the burglars were able at their leisure to enter them all and with little risk of detection. No clue has yet been discovered that would lead to the apprehension of these parties, and for a little time business men must be more than usual careful to secure their Stores and leave no loose money in their tills.—Freeman.

We are informed that the wages of laborers generally, in consequence of the short days and the fall in provisions, have been considerably reduced within the last week or two. The laborers at the Gas Works receive now only 4s. per day, and we learn that on the Railway both at the Bend and in the neighbourhood of the city 4s. are now paid. Flour is still declining. In New York common to straight state is quoted as low as \$6, 62½ per barrel.—Morning News.

NOVA SCOTIA.

The first class Railway Cars were landed from the barque "Black Swan," on Monday.

They are beautifully fitted up inside, with every accommodation, and will carry sixty passengers each. There is a tangible reality about our Railroad that we feel pleased with. There is enough Railroad iron to complete four miles, and as soon as the spikes arrive that much will be put down without delay. We have been "sitting on a rail" long enough, to make us anxious to ride on one.

It is to be regretted that the weather has been so unfavorable for the amusements going on. Yesterday was a remarkably fine day for Regatta, a good bracing northerly wind dissipated the lowering clouds that were hovering round us, giving place to a warm sun shine.

An immense number of people visited the scene of the Regatta yesterday. The citizens and their country friends appeared to have taken possession of the Island; and altho' it was pretty cold the folks remained to see the last of it. Some of the races were well contested; and all the other proceedings of the day were quite satisfactory.—Halifax Morning Journal.

H. M. ship of war Boscawen bearing the Flag of Admiral Fanshawe, will leave this Port to-day for Bermuda, and the West Indies. We understand that H. M. ship Leander and other large and powerful ships, with a steamer, have been ordered to join the squadron under the command of His Excellency. "Jocathan," will find some of these vessels briefly alongside the "Princeton," and other little cockle-shells, Nicaragua.—Halifax Sun.
