**EUROPEAN NEWS.**

St. John, July 6.

America arrived at Halifax this day, the 5th, at 10 o'clock, A. M.

War news important. Prussia will not formally declare war on Russia, but places a portion of army under orders of Austrian Emperor.

Baltic screw steamers proceeded to Cronstadt, forty in number, had been signalled at Cronstadt. Officers and crew of Tiger to be exchanged for Russian prisoners.

Siege of Silistria has been raised. Russians had been defeated by the Turks and driven across the Danube. Musa Pacha killed.—Paskewitch wounded, will probably die.

Desperate fighting on both sides, and complete discomfiture of the Russians.

Prince Gortsakoff, severely wounded. Schilders had leg shot of; two other general officers killed. Carnage among Russian troops dreadful.

The victory gained entirely by the Turks. French and English no having made their appearance.

Nothing particular from the Black Sea. Heavy guns had arrived. Sebastopol expected to be attacked soon.

Close blockade at mouth of the Danube.

Nothing of importance from the Baltic.

English ships Oden and Vulture, landed 150 men at Gambia, were attacked by Russians, and driven back to ships with loss of three officers, and two seamen killed. Two officers and 14 seamen wounded, 29 taken prisoners.

Insurrection in Greece extinct.

Circassia.—Russians defeated by Circassians, with great loss to Russians.

The Czar reported sick and for this reason did not meet the King of Prussia, but ordered Prince Dalgotoukie, Minister of War, to proceed at once to Danubian Principalities, and draw up an accurate report of the position of affairs with a military view.

France will assist to crush revolutionary movements in Hungary and Italy, while Austrian troops are fighting against Russians.

Conspiracy in department of Lagne, and Garonne, (France) to assassinate the Emperor discovered, 150 arrests made.
