EUROPEAN NEWS.

St. John, September 29, 1854.

The America arrived at Halifax at 5 1/2, A. M., on Thursday morning.

The Crimea Expedition sailed, the largest naval expedition in the annals of warfare.

Report says the Baltic fleet is ordered home, also that Sir Charles Napier wishes to resign: partly credited.

Anglo-French detachment landed at Ultricesborg, near Sweabourg, and destroyed some gun boats and set the Town on fire.

Russians had evacuated Brailow and Galts, consequently navigation of Danube free.

Count Cononini, on the 6th, at the head of 4,000 Austrians, entered Bucharest and was formally received by Omar Pacha.

Russian army on the frontier of Georgia has made a sudden and unexpected retrograde movement, it is reported that Shamy had gained a great victory.

Western powers have expressed themselves satisfied with Austria's resolution to remain for the present in armed neutrality.

Great confusion in Canton, Insurgents have taken several places near, and threatened Canton.

Cholera rapidly abating at Paris.

A new outbreak in Spain is expected, Queen Christiana has arrived at Lisbon, travelled under name of Countess Dilamende, Count Montimolin has issued circular to Carlists advising them to remain quiet.
