

CANADA.

THE Lake Superior Journal reports that copper has been discovered on the Canadian side of Lake Superior. The "veins are of the largest size and promise to rival in richness and extent the best mines now in the world." It is predicted that a mining business, unprecedentedly rich will be the result of these discoveries.

NEW WORK.

THE Quebec Chronicle states that Messrs. Lovell and Lamoureux, have just published the fifth and last volume of the History of Lower Canada, by Robert Christie, Esq., the late Member for Gaspé. The Editor of this paper thus notices the work:

"The Volume resumes the history of the outbreak of the rebellious disturbances in 1837, and carries it down to the Union of the Canadas, when the lower division ceased to be a separate Province. The whole has been compiled from official or authentic documents at a considerable cost of labor and time. And hence, as the author himself observes, some of the details given in the preceding volumes, may be deemed by many prolix and perhaps unnecessary; but they cannot fail to be interesting to the student of history, and most useful to future historians. The style of the original matter is plain and easily understood; but, from a desire seemingly to comprehend as much as possible in a small compass, or from habit otherwise acquired, the sentences are generally too long winded and intricate. We prefer the terseness of Sallust or Tacitus, even to the diffusiveness of Macaulay especially in a historical composition."

COUNTY OF GLOUCESTER.

A Correspondent at Bathurst, under date of November 30, writes as follows:

"The fine open weather which continues to prevail through the Northern Counties, has proved of essential advantage to the Farmer in saving the winter fodder for his cattle, and to the Merchant in getting the fall vessels off without the usual difficulties occasioned by ice and early frost."

"The Restigouche fleet is all away, and but one square rigger remains in Bathurst, Messrs. Smith's new Bark only awaiting the springs.—A few schooners with breadstuffs are yet due in both places."

"The heavy freshets so disastrous on the other side of the Province, has done little or no damage here. The preparations for winter operations, notwithstanding the late reverses in England, seem to proceed as usual at this season, and nothing denotes the approach of any serious crisis."

"The late change in the management of public affairs at Head Quarters has not been without its beneficial effects also. It was hailed generally with feelings of unmixed satisfaction.—Never before, perhaps, have the people experienced that feeling of security, that thorough confidence, that equal justice is within every man's reach, that they now have, and without which confidence and security, no people can fairly prosper, socially or politically."

"The New Brunswicker it is true, and a few other hired champions of the fallen dynasty, may pretend to doubt those assertions, but they are nevertheless, not the less true for all that. The Editor of the paper just named, has, it seems, picked up 'capital' enough to attempt raising a little tempest about the ears of the Reformers. He has made the circumstance of one of the members for Gloucester accepting more travelling allowance than he (the editor) thinks was right, a pretext to abuse the individual, to sneer at the 'ignorance' of his constituents, and to offer some presumptuous strictures on the present administration. It would have been as well had the Editor preserved his equanimity, and spared his indignation, for by falsifying facts, and attacking the innocent, he must totally fail in his object of enlisting sympathisers. The circumstance to which he refers, as it has been explained to me, may be simply stated thus:—Mr. End's allowance of mileage for travelling to the late session, was computed from his Residence in Boston, and not from the County he represented (neither was it all round as asserted by the New Brunswicker.) Mr. Tibbitt's in the same manner, was calculated from Quebec. Our first enquiry should be, not whether this was prudent and reasonable, but whether it was lawful. The act of Assembly it seems, expressly provides that the travel to the house should be computed from the 'place of residence.' It was, therefore, legal, and the Speaker, whose duty it was, had to certify to it in accordance with the statute. The Members of the Government, therefore, had no more to do with the matter than the Editor himself: if any party deserves blame, screen it as they may, it was the late imbecile Administration, who left such a Law on the Statute book. The difference between the allowance from Gloucester and that from Boston, I believe to be about twelve or thirteen pounds, and I have no doubt the constituents of Mr End will willingly restore that sum to the treasury, if it is determined by a proper tribunal, that it was improperly taken by their Representative, being satisfied that his co-operation in ejecting the

late obnoxious administration, and establishing friends of liberty and justice in its place, deserves much more at their hands than they now have the means of offering.

[It is scarcely worth while for the opposition to complain of Mr. End's travelling expenses, when they know that a prominent member of the late Government, who was receiving a large salary, continually drew from the Treasury his travelling fees, by the round-about way from the distant County he represented, while at the same time he resided in Fredericton, and nothing was said about it, until Mr Kerr, brought the matter before the Assembly at the last winter Session.] Editor Gleaner.
