YESTERDAY'S MAIL.

NEW BRUNSWICK.

Sudden Deaths.—Considerable uneasiness was caused in this city on Monday by the report of the sudden deaths of James Daly, policeman, and his wife. They resided in Mecklenburg street. About ten o'clock on Saturday night, Mr Daly was taken very ill, having cramps, great pain, violent vomiting, &c., and on Sunday afternoon about 3 o'clock he expired. Mrs Daly took ill on Sunday morning, about 6 o'clock, showed the same symptoms and died the same evening about 9 o'clock. The superintendent of Police says that Daly was a temperate steady man.

Various rumours were afloat, some saying that the parties were poisoned, others that these were cases of cholera, &c. An inquest was held on Monday and a post mortem examination took place.—There was no trace of poison and their death no doubt was caused by disease in some respects resembling cholera. It was reported that one of the children of the deceased had also been similarly attacked, but for this report there was no foundation.

On last Friday night this city was visited by another thunder storm. To add to the terrors of the night, in the midst of the tempest a fire broke out in the rear of the house belonging to Mr Ansley, and for a time blazed with great fury. The pealing of the thunder, hoarse and loud, the quick flashing of vivid lightning, the ringing of the fire-bells, the glare of the conflagration, and the torrents of rain combined to make the night really terrific. In spite of thunder and rain the firemen turned out and extinguished the fire, but not until Mr Ansley's pantries and back kitchen, forming an L some 38 feet in length, attached to the main building, the out offices of the whole range of buildings over 100 feet in length and a barn to the rear was destroyed.—The main building had caught fire and their preservation under the circumstances was wonderful.—The whole loss cannot, it is said, be less than £500. The buildings we believe were partially.

Protection of the Fisheries.—The following force will be on the fishing grounds this season for protection of the fisheries, and although it is smaller than last year, yet it is not doubted that it will be equal to meet the exigencies of the case, viz:—Brig Daring, 12 guns, Commander Napier; steamer Buzzard, 6. Commander Dobie; Canadian steamer Doris, 2; Government schr. Daring, 2 and two hired schrs. the Alice Rogers and the Sarah Adeline of 2 guns each. The Nova Scotia Government advertises for another schr.—New Brunswick.

UNITED STATES.

The Canadian Reciprocity Treaty.—The Mexican Treaty Ratified.—The Courier's Washington correspondent telegraphs as follows:

Washington, 21.—The Canadian Reciprocity Treaty was submitted to-day, and referred to the Committee on Foreign Relations, and ordered to be printed. The prospect of its ratification is better.

The Mexican Treaty is finally ratified. The President announces the fact in a message, and asks the House to make immediate provision for the payment of the seven millions, and for the other three millions within six months. These propositions are badly received, and fierce opposition is expected from both Whigs and Democrats, on the ground of corruption in the negotiations of the treaty, and secondly, that the land acquired is entirely worthless. A resolution calling for instructions and for all papers relating to the treaty will be presented.

Destructive Fire at Philadelphia, and Loss of Life.—On Tuesday last, the large cotton and woolen mill on Jefferson and Millin streets, Kensington, was destroyed by fire, together with a large stock of goods and materials. The fire is said to have been caused by friction of the machinery. The loss is estimated at \$60,000.

About 300 persons, mostly females, were usually employed in the building, but at the time of the catastrophe, but 130 were at work. The flames having cut off the means of escape by the stairway, a terrible scene ensued among those in the upper stories, who commenced jumping from the windows, and but for the brave exertions of the firemen, with their hooks and ladders, nearly all must have perished. It is reported that fifteen persons are missing, and a man and two young ladies are certainly lost. A man named McLean jumped from the third story and broke both his legs. A female who jumped from the fourth story also broke both her legs. Three sisters named McBride were terribly injured; and a large number barned about the hands and face.

The Cuban Filibustering Expedition, which was fitting out at New Orleans, is said to have been postponed for the present, in consequence of a lack of funds, caused by the recent failures of several of its leading backers in New Orleans.

It is further said that a new effort is to be made to raise money among the planters of the south west, and the calculation is that 5,000 men comprising the first division, will be embarked before the first of July. Gen. Quitman is to be the commander of the expedition.

The great tubular iron bridge over the St. Lawrence, at Montreal, has been commenced. Fifteen hundred workmen are to be employed on it this summer.

The N. Y. Sun says there is a large building on Cherry street of that city, one hundred and fifty feet in length, which is occupied by three hundred Irish families. One entrance on the street suffices for the use of one hundred and eighty families. A number of persons have died of cholera there within a few days past.

Advices from Barbadoes of May 30th, state that the cholera was raging there to a considerable extent confined principally to the colored population. On the previous Sunday there were twenty burials in one grave yard.

The City of Glasgow.—The ill-fated screw steamship, with its 480 souls on board, is at last given up. As may be remembered, she sailed from Liverpool on the first of March, with 111 cabin and saloon passengers, and about 362 steerage, her crew numbered 76, including the commander, Capt. Morrison; and from the period of clearing the Mersey up to the present moment, not the least tidings have been heard of her. The breaking up of the immense fields of ice to the Northward of the Bank, which were borne down the Atlantic in masses, it is said, of some 2 or 300 miles in length, no doubt overwhelmed the vessel in an attempt to force a passage, and caused her almost immediate destruction, not a soul escaping. The City of Glasgow and her cargo were insured for £50,000.—Boston Times.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.

Sir Alexander Bannerman's Reply to the People of Prince Edward Island.

Gentlemen,—It has frequently fallen to my lot on the other side of the Atlantic, to express my gra-

titude to those who reposed confidence in me, and for many years continued me in the British Parliament to represent their interests. I could easily thank them, but in the position in which I am placed it is so easy to thank you, as I feel I ought to do for your very kind and affectionate address.

You are now aware that the days I shall have the honour to preside over this community are numbered. I am not sorry it should be so, for I believe that changes of Governors and Administrations often prove beneficial to the people. I considered it necessary ten days ago to dissolve the House of Assembly, and for so doing you will be amused to find that I am designated a tyrant, a Charles the first, an Oliver Cromwell. I am not surprised at this, for I have heard that what is termed in Prince Edward Island the "upper crust of society" think that I have rendered the colony uninhabitable; and when the new Franchise Bill comes into operation that it will not be safe to live in it, and that a General Election will endanger the peace of society.

Now, I feel very confident that those to whom the Franchise has been granted in this Island will exercise that privilege as quietly and peaceably as in any part of Her Majesty's dominions; and I sincerely trust that the Colony will continue to be always as contented and tranquil as it has been my good fortune to find it the last three years. The important measures which have, during that period, been sanctioned by the Crown, will not, I think, lessen your loyalty and attachment to the Queen. And I embrace this opportunity of telling you that her Colonial Ministers have paid the greatest attention to your affairs; and recommended to Her Majesty to assent to all the Acts of your Legislature passed in that time.

I hope that after the General Elections there will be less political excitement and animosity than have prevailed here for some months back; and that the press, while it manfully advocates the opinions of the respective parties whom it supports, will abstain from those personalities which too frequently would the feelings of families, and cannot be easily forgiven or forgotten. Much has yet to be done for the Colony; new sources of industry will open to its inhabitants, and among others, I expect the discovery that it possesses Coal Mines, like the adjacent Provinces; and the Island, by the blessing of God, I trust will continue to prosper; and I hope that you and yours will be as happy as I wish you to be.

I will not trespass longer on your time. I accept your address with gratitude, and carry it along with me to another Colony, where many of its inhabitants are of a different complexion from you; and I believe I also carry along with me your earnest prayer, that wherever I go I may, under Providence, be of some use to that portion of mankind whose interests are entrusted to my care, of whatever race or colour.
