We would call the attention of our merchants to the following paragraph, respecting the Timber Trade of Canada. The information thus furnished is valuable, as it affords some useful hints to which it would be well to take heed.

Since we last issued our Circular we have had a great deal of Easterly Wind, which has delayed the timber on its way to market, and very few rafts have as yet arrived compared to late years. The season generally has been very backward, and much that parties expected would be in market in May and June, will not reach till July and August.

Notwithstanding this, the heavy Stock of White Pine that wintered over and the gloomy accounts from England, owing to the tightness of the money markets, and the expected falling off in consumption have prevented any great buoyancy in the market for white Pine.

If rafts continue to arrive as sparingly as they have done of late however, we may expect much more animation in the article.

Red Pine—Is dull at our quotation, the demand being limited and the price too high for ship ment.

Oak and Elm—Are both scarce and much wanted.

Tamarac—Is offering in small parcels at reduced rates and the prospects for shipbuilders not being altogether favourable, few parties are inclined to lay in stock at present rates, except for very large girths.

For Standard Staves—There is a very animated demand at our quotations. W. O. Pouchon have declined 10s. as parties are offering at £17 10s.

Deals—Are still held at £17 for late, but the news from England by no means warrant an expectation that these rates will be current after the present demand is over for immediate shipment.

Freights—Since our last freights are lower; we quote 48s. for Clyde, and a lower rate for Liverpool would be taken as traders and new ships are offering freely. To London about £7 a £7 5s. for all deals. To the outports, 50s. to Holyhead; 50s. to Hull; 48s. to Newport, and about same rate for Cardiff are the last quotations, and 50s. for ports higher up the Channel.

SAD ACCIDENT.

As the Steamer Col. Fremont, was towing Mr. Johnston's new vessel down the River on Wednesday last, the Stewardess, Rosanna Bell, aged 17, and the Engineer, Alfred Bloucher, aged 22, while romping on deck, accidentally fell overboard, and before any assistance could be extended to them, they were both unfortunately drowned. The bodies have not yet been recovered.

COUNTY GLOUCESTER.
