

DIPLOMATIC ARRANGEMENT WITH ROME.—Declarations have been exchanged between the governments of Great Britain and the Roman States, for securing national treatment to the vessels and commerce of each country in the ports of the other. The arrangement did not take the usual form of a treaty.

INDIA AND CHINA.—The Indian mail with dates from Bombay to Jan. 14th, has arrived. Madras was threatened with famine, rains and crops having failed, and there will be great loss of revenue in Nellore.

The Niagara and Cambria have been chartered to take out the guards. They will be able to take out about 1,000 each.

The British contingent for the defence of Turkey will amount to 20,000 men, with 40 guns; 250 picked men in each battalion are to be armed with Minie rifles and brigade command will be conferred on young colonels.

CONSTANTINOPLE. Jan. 27.—Fifteen days, was the period fixed by the Admirals for the Russian vessels to return to their harbour in the Black Sea.

A camp for 40,000 men is marked out at a place on the Sea of Marmora six miles from Constantinople.

In Asia Gen. Guyon had resumed offensive operations against the Russians.

The Emperor has given orders to every fort to drive the Turks out of Lesser Wallachia, without further loss of time.

The French ocean squadron had arrived at Algiers. The discovery of a Greek conspiracy in the dominions of the Sultan had induced the French government to address a note, couched in strong and energetic terms, to King Otho.

UNITED STATES.

TERRIBLE ACCIDENT.—Harford, March 2. About two o'clock this afternoon, the new steam boiler of Fales & Gray's car factory exploded, destroying the blacksmiths shop and engine room, and badly shattering the main building. There were over 300 persons employed in the factory, over 100 of whom were in the part of the building which was uninjured. The explosion was terrific, breaking timbers, powerful machinery, and every thing about the building, in pieces, and prostrating the walls for 100 feet in length. The glass of the main building was broken. The roof and walls fell in a huge mass over the men employed, burying them beneath the ruins.

Efforts were immediately made by the remaining operatives, the fireman, (who were called out for that purpose,) and the citizens, who crowded in large numbers to the spot, to rescue those beneath the ruins. The Mayor superintended the extrication of the bodies, and the ruins were removed with all possible despatch. Nine persons were killed instantly, seven more died shortly after, and many others were badly injured.

The immediate cause of the explosion may never be known. The boiler was a new one, of fifty horse power, built of the best materials, and with the greatest care. It has been conjectured that the water was suffered to get too low.

It is estimated that the loss of the building and machinery will be from \$20,000 to \$30,000.

TELEGRAPHIC COMMUNICATION WITH CUBA.—The surveying party of the Crawford, which left Norfolk last week for Florida, will, by direction of Prof. Bache, run a line of deep sea soundings from Key West to Havana, with the view of ultimately carrying the telegraph wires across to the island of Cuba.

TRAGEDY AT RANDOLPH.—A most terrible tragedy took place this morning at Randolph, in this State. The facts, as reported to us by a gentleman from the scene, are as follows: Mr Augustus Wilbur, a respectable citizen of Randolph killed his wife with an axe, this morning, as she was seated at the breakfast table, and afterwards cut his own throat with a razor. There were seven children at the table; the eldest ran to the house of the nearest neighbour to give the alarm, while the second took up two of the other children and fled for safety. When the neighbours reached the house, both of the wounded persons were dead upon the floor, while the two smallest children were at the table, fastened, as usual, into their chairs.

A terrible accident occurred on Sunday night at the French Opera House, in New Orleans, the gallery falling during the performance, carrying away the second tier of boxes. Three persons were killed and over fifty wounded.

NEWFOUNDLAND.

By the arrival of the Ospray, we have dates to the 24th. The Legislature of the Island been convened on the 1st Jany.

The principal topic of discussion in the Legislature was on the subject of Responsible Government. The house had determined to await for despatches expected from England which it was supposed "would doom them to the despotic yoke of Responsible Government" and had accordingly adjourned until the 20th March. In the meantime the pressing business of the Island had come to a stand.

The people on the North Shores of Conception were in great distress. The Government had sent a quantity of meal for their relief.—*B. N. American.*
