CHATHAM PARISH MEETING.

The annual meeting of the inhabitants of the Parish for the appointment of Parish Officers for the present year, took place in the Roman Catholic Temperance Hall on Tuesday last. The meeting was conducted in a most satisfactory manner; but we think the selections would be more judiciously made, if the parishioners would appoint about a dozen individuals to make choice of the officers, instead of their being appointed by the voice of the assembly. The law is very defective, more particularly in that part, which allows no amendment to be made to the person put in nomination. The consequence is, that in the excitement of the moment, very injudicious persons are selected, which would not be the case if twelve persons, from different parts of the Parish, were to sit down quietly, and make the appointments. John M. Johnson, Senior, Esq., Presided.

A Resolution was passed at the meeting—that all work on the Public Highways, beyond £5, should be done by Public Contract. It will be seen by the Nineteenth section of the law passed in 1850, which we copy below, that the duty of the Commissioners, in this particular, is clearly defined.

"And be it enacted, That if any person in such list named, prefer paying money to doing such labour, it shall and may be lawful for such Commissioners, or in cases where the Parish is divided into districts, for the District Commissioner to take and receive from such person, the sum of one shilling and three pence for each day's labour required to be done by him; and the moneys that may be paid in lieu of such labour, as well as forfeitures which may be received by virtue of this Act, shall be laid out under the direction of the Commissioners, or where the Parish is divided into Districts, by the Commissioner of the District, on such highways, roads, streets and bridges, between the first day of May and first day of October in every year; and it shall further be the duty of such Commissioner or Commissioners receiving such sum or sums of money, to give six days notice, by public advertisement within the District, of the time and place where they respectively intend to expend the same, and to attend at the time and place so appointed in such advertisement, and let out the said work by public auction to the lowest bidder."

EUROPEAN NEWS.

St. John, January 4.

New York, December 30.—Africa arrived at 11 o'clock, A. M.

Lord Palmerston has resigned Home Secretaryship. Lord J. Russell expected to occupy the office. Lord Lansdowne expected to resign, and Lord Panmure to succeed.

Intelligence of the defeat at Sinope, caused great sensation at Constantinople. The Grand Divan immediately convened, all foreign Ministers present. Reported that allied fleet ordered to the Black Sea.

Persia has declared war against Turkey. Battle between Russians and Turks on the Armenian Frontier, 4,000 Turks killed. Desperate fighting in Asia. Russian fortress captured, and 15,000 Russians defeated in pitched battle.

Hostilities suspended on the Danube. MARKETS.—Flour active, 6d. dearer. Wheat 2d. to 3d. dearer, Corn 6d. to 1s. dearer, Tea, Coffee and Sugar, quiet.

St. John, January 6.

Canada arrived at Halifax on Wednesday at 8 A. M., with 63 passengers.

By Sub-marine Telegraph.—Turkish war. It was creditably asserted, that the combined English, French and Turkish fleets entered the Black Sea on the 10th of December, supposed destination, Sebastopol.

The Czar having frequently declared the entry of ships of war into the Black Sea, equivalent to a declaration of war, the withdrawal of the Russian Ministers from London and Paris, is looked for immediately.

It is semi-officially announced from Vienna, that the fleets entered the Black Sea on a peaceful errand, to prevent further collisions. The diplomatics are as busy as ever on the line of the Danube.

There was some fighting on the 4th of December. The Russians attacked the Turkish position of Kalafat, and forced the outer entrenchments, but were eventually repulsed. The carnage and wounded said to be about 4,000.

On 13th, two Russian steamers towing four gun boats, unsuccessfully attacked the Turkish position at Matschum, and were forced to retire with severe loss.

General tenor of the advices indicate that the operations of the last week in November, were unfavourable to the Turks.

The rupture between Persia and Britain was anterior to the declaration of war of Persia against Turkey, and was caused by insults offered to the British embassy.

Relations between Austrian minister and the Divan were daily becoming colder, on various pretexts.

The British Ambassador has ordered the British Consul at Jassy to retire from the Principalities.

England.—The Cabinet Counsel met on the 23rd. Lord Lansdowne, not present. Sir George Grey pleaded ill-health, as reason for declining the proffered post of Home Secretary among others. Rumour offers it to Sir James Graham, Sir C. Wood, and Lord Panmure. Liberal papers complain that Prince Albert is making himself too busy in the affairs of the army, and some attribute the retirement of Palmerston to a cabal in that quarter. There are complaints also that he interferes in politics.

Latest News.—Morning Chronicle says—France and England are now fully agreed upon taking the most efficient measures to coerce Russia, and that instructions are given the Admirals to stop all Russian ships found crossing the Black Sea.

The Presse of Thursday says—the combined fleets had not entered the Black Sea on the 12th.

MARKETS.—Money market unchanged. Funds fluctuating. Consols closed at 93 3/4 to 93 7/8. Breadstuffs—week opened active, but demand fell towards the close. Advances for the week—2d. on Wheat, 6d. on Flour, 1s. on Indian Corn.

Clipper ship Staffordshire, Richardson, is wrecked on the Blonde Rock, off Cape Sable, Capt. R. with 170 to 200 passengers drowned.
