That all persons desirous to exhibit any Article of Domestic Manufacture, Grain, Garden Seeds, or Dairy Produce, shall accompany the same with a statement setting forth that the Exhibitor is the owner of the article in question. If Domestic Manufactures, that the materials were produced, and the articles manufactured, and prepared, within the County during the past year. If Grains or Seeds, that they were raised by the Exhibitor, on the premises occupied by him during the previous year, and were not exhibited for a premium, at this Society's Show on any former occasion. And if Dairy Produce, a similar statement, subscribed by the Committee, when the articles are presented for competition.
