A horst is a remarkably healthy locality, and possesses peculiar advantages for children of delicate constitutions. The play ground, which is large and enclosed, with a high close board fence, is fitted up with a circular swing and other facilities for gymnastics, and the proprietor has recently erected in it, a covered shed upwards of sixty feet in length, for exercises in wet weather. The size of the furrow, shall be a consideration of merit with the Judges.

CATTLE SHOW.
