St. John July 8.

Baltic at New York this morning in nine days and twelve hours.

Vienna despatch, asserts positively, that Russia out of consideration for Austria, has consented to evacuate the Principalities.

Lord John Russell officially announces this to Parliament.

Siege of Silestria raised. Advanced guard of Allies had reached Prevand. Omar Pacha's whole force advancing to the Danube.

England has sent Sir John Bonham to negotiate Commercial Treaty with Japan.

Weather fine in England and France.

Consols 94 1-8. Breadstuffs dull, with further decline; 6d. on flour and indian corn; 2d. on wheat.

Latest.—Austrians are to take possession of Principalities when Russians withdraw.

Nothing from the Baltic, Black Sea, or Asia.

St. John, July 13.

The Asia arrived at New York last night. The Caar's official reply to Austria expected July 3.

Russians falling back on Pruth, in good order.

Allied army had reached Varna.

Napier's fleet was near Cronstadt.

Bombersund, on the Baltic had been bombarded, and partially destroyed.

Austria is preparing to march 100,000 troops into Principalities, thus interposing barrier to further hostilities. This is supposed will entirely change plan of war.
