## ENGLAND AND THE UNITED STATES.

THE Washington correspondents of the New York Journal of Commerce, thus writes to that paper, giving his views why the Americans sympathise with Russia in the present struggle in which the Allies are engaged, to maintain the balance of power in Europe, and prevent the iron hoof of Russia from crushing the weaker states, and stopping the progress of civil and religious liberty in the old world.

"The intelligence from the Crimea, as was expected, is discouraging to the Allies, and if as asserted, the majority of the people of the U. States sympathize with Russia in the conflica they have reason to be content with the result, so far. The chief interest which the United States have in the matter, is a commercial, not a political character, and those events which are best calculated to secure an early peace ought to be most acceptable to them 3 for the continuance bucto, leaving a wife and three children to hof the war deranges and depresses business all out of, feaving a over the world; and the diversion of so much capital and industry from ordinary pursuits to war, willinjuriously affect our commerce, as well quodobit will preach in the Wesleyan Chapel, war, will injuriously affect our commerce, as well as that of the nations who are parties to the sirife.
