II. That every Tavern Keeper shall keep good. Stabling and Hay, Oats. X II Every Wholesale Dealer, shall have painted "Wholesale Dealer", and every Tavorn Keeper shall have pained "Licenced Tavern," over the door of the places respectively in which they are Licenced to self, with their names respectively thereon under a Penalty of One Pound, for each and every offence.

XIV. A Breach of the foregoing Rules and Re-XIV. A Breach of the foregoing fules and Regulations, or any of them, by any member of the Family, or servant of any Wholesale Dealer, or Tavern Keeper, respectively, shall be decread and taken to be a breach by such Wholesale Dealer, or Tavern Keeper himself, and he or she shall be liable therefor, and dealt with accordingly.
