EUROPE.

TRADE .- The returns issued by the Board of Trade, showing the total exports and im-ports during the past year, compared with 1852 (and which will be found elsewhere), afford abundant proof of the increasing prospeti-ity of this country, although such results could scarcely have been anticipated during the last year, marked as it has been by the increased ed with the strength of the Turkish troops in value of money, rumours of war, and "strikes" in the manufacturing districts. The improve-ment has been diffused among every branch of industry; and, what is considered singular, the only item on the adverse side is the article of Wool, which has decreased nearly one halt. The chief articles which exhibits an improvement are Metals Cotton Manufactures, and which the attack on Isaktchi was attempted. Haberdashery. The entire increase in the de-clared value of our exports has been £15,982,-240, while the increase of 1852 over the year preceding was £284,465. The imports for the year have also been satisfactory.

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The Bullion market remains without material change. Silver continues in demand with a bare supply, and late quotations well maintained. The exports of Gold is large, chiefly to Paris, and exceeds the imports, which have been considerable.

He succeed-ed in obtaining the money, but the fraud was afterwards discoverd, and he was prosecuted, and after much delay convicted. When Gardiner heard of his conviction, he committed

DESTRUCTIVE FIRE IN PORTLAND .- We regret to record that the valuable and extensive iron Foundry belonging to Messrs. The fire was by the active exertions of ths engine men, prevented from communicating with the dwelling houses in the vincinity although the supply of water was very defici-ent—every engine either receiving or discharg-ing thro' over 1000 feet of hose. The loss of Messrs. Harris & Allan is very

serious, and the destruction of these fine works will be also a great public inconvenience, hap-

pening as it does, at a time when an exten-sive spring business is about commencing. The damage sustained by this conflagration is from £6000 to £8000, on which only £1500 is insured. The fire broke out at about half past 11 o'clock, but how it originated is not known.—St. John Chronicle.
