EUROPEAN NEWS.

St. John, June 22.

The Canada arrived at Halifax, on Wednesday morning.

Advances of Russians towards Allied Armies has created uneasiness in monied world at Paris, also, better class of people were quitting St. Petersburg, they fear the Cossacks, who were now arriving.

Rumors of Turkish intrigue in the Council; Russian bribery is hinted. Silesia still holds out. Russians are making desperate efforts to take it. St. Arnaud had sent 70,000 to relieve, and Mussa Pacha says he will blow up himself and fortress rather than surrender. Night—29th, Russians made three attempts to storm it, but were repulsed with fearful loss; 4,500 is reported as wounded and slain.

May 31.—Turks defeated 2,000 Russians.

St. Antona killed 500, and took their artillery.

21st May—Admiral Hambur, for the last 20 days was cruising off Sebastopol without meeting the enemy.

Letter from the Doctor of the Tiger says, prisoners are well treated by Russians.

Nothing done in Baltic.

English and French fleet at anchor near Cronstadt, in line across the gulf, so as to cut off enemy's communication with St. Petersburg, by sea.

Greek insurrection quelled; all functionaries and all concerned, dismissed, including four aids-de-camp of the king.

Emperor of Morocco has declared to France and England, that no Russian flag shall enter Moorish ports.

Kossuth made an eloquent speech at Sheffield, on the Nationality of Poland.

10,000 sabres taken from the tower of London to equip an equal number of Turkish cavalry.

Spain.—Six War Steamers to be sent to Cuba, with 6,000 additional troops.

Liverpool Breadstuffs—Flour 6d. dearer; Yellow Corn 1s.; Western Canal Flour 38s. to 38s. 6d.; Philadelphia and Baltimore 38s. 6d. to 39s.; Ohio 39s. 6d. Consuls closed at 90 3-4; Eagles 76s. 6d. Freight from Liverpool to United States firm. Tonnage scarce.

COUNTY OF GLOUCESTER.

At a Special Session of the Peace, held at Bathurst, in and for the County of Gloucester, on Tuesday the 16th day of May, in the year of our Lord One Thousand Eight Hundred and Fifty Four, for the purpose of Granting Wholesale and Tavern Licenses, pursuant to the 27th Section of the Act of Assembly, 17 Victoria, Chap. 14, it was

ORDERED, that in future, all persons applying for Tavern Licenses, shall make their application by Petition to the General Sessions, stating the particular locality of the house for which the License is prayed; that the Petitioner is capable of complying with the requirements of section 6th of the said act; the nature and amount of accommodation for travellers, and tendering the names of two responsible persons, as sureties, for the observance of the laws, and regulations of the Sessions, made, and to be made, for the government of Taverns; and further ordered, that the truth of the allegation, shall be certified to the Court by the nearest resident Justice of the Peace.
