Extra Charges.—Music, Piano or Spanish Guitar three lessons per week £2 per quarter, or half term. SINGING, two lessons per week, 10s. per quarter or half term. DRAWING, Pencil or Crayon, five lessons per week, £1 per quarter or half term. Colored Crayon five lessons per week, £1 10s. per quarter or half term. Monochromatic, plain or blended, three lessons per week, £1 10s. per quarter or half term. FRENCH, five lessons per week, £1 10s. per quarter or half term. The next quarter, or half term, will commence 6th October and end 21st December. The Winter term, will commence 6th January and end 5th June. There are five Pianos in the Establishment, and Four Music Teachers, and the practicings are under their immediate and constant supervision.
