The route we understand, does not involve the necessity of laying any submarine wire for more than 500 miles in any one section, and on that account will probably supersede the line projected to the coast of Ireland from St. John's.—*N. Y. Tribune.*

We have much pleasure in acknowledging on behalf of the New Brunswick Bible Society, the receipt of £31 15s. Collected by Mr. James Girvan, from friends of the Bible cause in Richibucto, in aid of the Chinese New Testament Fund. The contributions most liberal and praiseworthy.—*Church Witness.*

College Commission.—The gentlemen appointed to act as Commissioners in this matter left Fredericton on Friday morning last after a sitting of some days—a visit to the College and to the Collegiate School, and a conference with the Chief Superintendent of Schools. We understand that they are about to proceed to the States, in order to acquire further information, and that one or their number is afterwards to accompany D. Ryerson to Canada, to witness the mode in which educational affairs are managed in that Province, and ascertain the possibility of its successful adoption here.—*Head Quarters.*

The Cunard reserve Mail Steamer Osprey arrived in our harbour on Monday last, for the purpose of conveying several companies of the 76th Regiment, including the head quarters, staff and band, to Halifax, for which port she sailed next day, and arrived there on Thursday.

A company of the 76th remains at Fredericton and another in this garrison.

FIRE.—About 8 o'clock last night, a fire broke out in the London Clothing Store on the North East side of the Market Square, which had been lately fitted up in a very attractive style by Messrs. Doherty & McAvish. Almost in an instant the beautiful glass front was destroyed. The Engines were quickly on the ground, and were worked with much vigor; but the flames were not checked until the building was a total wreck. Of the stock, which was a very valuable one any that was not destroyed by fire must have been rendered all but worthless. We are unable to ascertain to what extent the building and stock were insured. The enterprising owners are men to whom the city owes much and we trust their loss may prove inconsiderable. The adjoining houses, though of wood, were but slightly injured.—*Freeman.*

FREIGHTS FROM MONTREAL TO ST. JOHN.—We learn that arrangements have been made for carrying flour over the Grand Trunk Railroad from Montreal, and by the steamer Governor to St. John, at the rate of 70c. per barrel.

On Monday the Market Slip was full of woodboats well laden, and there was a decline in the price of wood. Flour, potatoes, and all the other necessities of life are falling in price and cordwood cannot remain an exception, especially, as coals seem likely to be comparatively cheap, there is still a great deal of wood in the country that must be sold within a few weeks, and unless the buyers are foolish enough to pay any price that will be asked it may yet be sold at a fair rate.—The prices hitherto obtained were enormous.—*Freeman.*

NOVA SCOTIA.

NOVA SCOTIA INDUSTRIAL EXHIBITION.—This day will unfold to the anxious multitude the monuments of our country's genius in the skill and ingenuity exhibited within the Provincial Halls. Notwithstanding the apprehensions of the timid respecting the success of the enterprise, we are happy in being able to announce that His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor will formally declare the Exhibition open to-day, at the hour of two o'clock, P. M. We have been permitted a sight of some of the specimens of Mechanism forwarded for Exhibition, and are confident they will stand competition. We believe the display will be a creditable one, both to its contributors and the Province generally. This is the first opportunity ever presented for developing the Industrial resources of the country, and we sincerely hope it will be eminently successful.

No pains has been spared on the part of the Executive Committee in carrying out and perfecting their arrangements. The people generally must feel indebted to those gentlemen of the Committee who have devoted their time and energies, labouring day and night in behalf of the Exhibition. Our city mechanics have awakened up, and with but a short time for preparations, will make a very handsome display.

After the close of the Procession, we presume there will be an immense rush for Tickets, every body anxious to witness everything that's to be seen. We wish them a pleasant time of it, believing that the entrance fee will be well expended and everybody amply repaid who visits the Provincial Industrial Exhibition.

CIVIC ELECTIONS.—The annual election for Mayor, Aldermen and Assessors, took place on Monday last. Henry Pryor, Esq.,

was re-elected Mayor by a majority of 118 over Archibald Scott, Esq.—*Morning Journal.*

The Collector of New York has decided, with the approval of his Govt., that "Pictou coal is liable to duty, until concurrent legislation of the colonies, ratifying the Treaty, shall have removed it." How many chalirons of Pictou and Cape Breton coal will probably be shipped to ports in United States between this third day of October, 1854, and March, 1855? and what the amount of duty paid thereon?—*Halifax Sun.*

Pictou Eastern Chronicle says:—A branch line of the Electric Telegraph Company now connects from Arichat to the line between Sydney and the strait of Canso, and an office has been opened for some days at the former place. A large amount of business will likely be done in the Arichat office. A line has been built at Cape Canso, through Guysboro, connecting with the main line at Antigonishe, and in both these places offices are expected to be opened in a few days.

4th The Society will provide for the Ferryage of all Horses, that have been actually engaged in the competition of the day.

5th The size of the furrow, to be 8 inches by 4 1/2 inches; or as near thereto as Ploughmen can approximate. The size of the furrow, shall be a consideration of merit with the Judges.

CATTLE SHOW.

RULES AND REGULATIONS.

1st All Horses and Cattle must be on the ground and ready to be entered for competition by 11 o'clock A. M., after 12 o'clock none will be admitted.

2nd To render any animal admissible for competition by a member of the society, it is only necessary that the exhibitor be prepared to prove by certificate, that he is the owner of such animal, and its breed and age.

3rd Three Judges will be appointed, whose names shall be announced by the Secretary on the morning of the show.
