## LIVERPOOL TIMBER TRADE.

By the last mail we obtained copies of Farnworth & Jardine, and A. F. & D. Mackay's Timber Circulars of the 15th September. The accounts they furnish of the prices of our staple commodity, are not very satisfactory. We furnish below some extracts.

Yellow Pine Timber, Quebec, per cubic foot 1s 4d to 1s 6d. St. John's 18 inches average 1s 9d. Miramichi 1s 3d. Bay Chaleur 1s 4d. Richibucto 1s 3d.

Deals, Quebec, Yellow, per standard, 1st quality £16; 2nd do £12; 3d do £10.

Planks, Spruce, per stand. hundred, St. John's &c., N. B. £9 to £9 10. Nova Scotia £8 10 to £8 15.

Pine Timber.—The arrivals from Quebec continue to be large, which, with a considerable falling off in the consumption, has caused a great depreciation in the value.

The supply hitherto has been much in excess of the demand, and importers continue to yard their cargoes. To maintain even present prices the import for the remainder of the season should almost cease, as present stocks are sufficient for the wants of consumers.

From St. John two cargoes of Pine have arrived, which are being stored. The supply of this article at present is moderate, but having to compete with the better qualities of Quebec at the reduced prices, is difficult of sale even at 3d over the inch average. A parcel of Miramichi Pine, 9000 feet, ex "Annie Wilson," sold at 15d per foot, with 4000 feet Birch at same price.

Hardwood, of good quality, is saleable at 18d to 20d per foot, whereas old and inferior Wood is almost unsaleable.

Pine and Spruce Deals.—The supply during the past fortnight has been moderate, which has caused more steadiness in the value of Deals, still, with the large stock now here, and the diminished consumption, the importation from this period to the close of the year will require to be very much less than an average of the two past years, if our present quotations are to be supported.

Halfway Sleepers.—The last sale was a parcel of Yellow Pine 9.10 x 5, at 3s 3d each.—Farnworth & Jardine.

Pine Timber.—As reported in our last Printed Circular, the greater part of the import from Quebec has been stored on importers' account. The late arrivals are in course of yarding. Of Miramichi, a parcel was sold conditionally at 15d per foot.

N. B. and N. S. Pine and Spruce Deals.—Owing to the late fine weather and the undoubted fact of an abundant harvest being secured, this article is in better request, more, however, with a feeling that there will shortly be an improved demand, than from any immediate want of the consumers.—A. F. & D. Mackay.

## CANADA.

THE Quebec Journals inform us that the Bill to give effect to the Reciprocity Treaty, was passed through all its stages in both branches of Legislature, in the short space of TWO HOURS, rather quick for judicious legislation, which this important act required. If we are to judge from the tone of the Press in the two Provinces, the formation of the present coalition Government gives but little satisfaction to the people.

## INQUEST.

AN Inquest was held before M. Cranney, Esq., Coroner, on Monday last, in the parish of Nelson, on view of the body of Catherine Wallace, a child five years old, who with her little brother, were playing in the field near her father's residence, on Saturday last, when she ignited a match she took from the house, and set fire to her clothes, and before assistance could be rendered, she was so badly burnt that she died next morning, (Sunday.)

Verdict—Accidental death by her clothes catching fire.

## EUROPEAN NEWS.

St. John, October 7.

Canada arrived at New York yesterday morning.

Officially announced, by French and English Governments, that on the 14th, 58,000 Allies landed at Eupatoria, without opposition, and immediately marched on Sebastopol. Transports returned to Varna for 14,000 more French.

Reported Czar at last movement had consented to terms. Not generally credited.

Allied fleets were off Sebastopol.

It is said that Russians have only 38,000 disposable forces in the Crimea.
