

May 27.—Lieut.-General Baron von Wrangle, commander of the troops in the peninsula of Kertch, announces that on the 24th some troops which arrived from Sebastopol on board the enemy's fleet, effected a descent near Kamysch Burnou, taking the battery of Pavlovskaya, and occupying Kertch and Yenikale. Our garrison, after having spiked the guns, and destroyed as much as possible of the government stores and of the vessels, fell back without great loss on the village of Argatse.

LATEST MONETARY AND COMMERCIAL.—The English Funds opened this morning at a further advance of 1-8, which were fully maintained to the close. The market, in the absence of fresh news from Sebastopol, being strengthened by the receipt of higher prices from the Paris Bourse. The favorable weather is likewise exercising a decided influence. The operations of the day were not numerous, business being in suspense from the momentary expectation of important intelligence. In the Foreign Exchange there was no marked alteration from the rates of last post, but bills continue in demand. The increase in the Bank stock of bullion amounts to £724,321.

Her Majesty's steamer Calliope arrived at Plymouth last night, with 70,500 oz of gold from Melbourne, which port she left on the 27th march. On the 3rd day she spoke the barque Robert White-way 42 day from Liverpool.

NEW BRUNSWICK

Thursday last was generally observed in this City as a day of humiliation and prayer, for the success of the British arms. All business was suspended, and the different places of public worship were well attended, the Pastors of which addressed their hearers in most appropriate terms.—New Brunswicker.

UNITED STATES.

Terrible Poisoning Affair.—A marriage party from Washington county, Md., were this week poisoned by eating mustard, in which arsenic had been placed. Some 25 of them are not expected to live. The bride among the number. All the servants were also sick from eating the custard.

Forty million feet of lumber have been surveyed at Bangor the present season, against ten million for the corresponding time last year. Orders for it realize the anticipation of dealers but the ruling prices are somewhat lower than last year.

CANADA.

Canadian Volunteers for the Crimea.—The Albany Argus, on Tuesday say:—

The train from Suspension Bridge which arrived here at a late hour on Monday night brought a company of volunteer Canadian riflemen, armed and equipped, bound for the Crimea. They left yesterday morning, via the Western Railroad, for Boston where they will to-day ship on board a packet for Constantinople. The company numbers some sixty members, young, athletic, hardy sons of Canada, who state that they "shall not come back until they lick the Russians."

We understand that the Hon. J. Chace, one of the members of this city, has resigned his seat in the Legislative Assembly, in order to accept office as a visiting Commissioner under the Seigneurial Tenure Bill. This will necessitate an election for a member in his stead, and if Mr Okill Stuart come forward as the candidate, as is anticipated, few entertain any doubt of his success. It is not probable that the writ for the new election will be issued until shortly before the re-assembling of Parliament.—Quebec Morning Chronicle.

BY TELEGRAPH.

TO MIRAMICHI GLEANER OFFICE.

St. John, June 21.

Steamer Asia arrived at Halifax yesterday morning at 1 1/2 o'clock.

The War.—The general Bombardment of Sebastopol recommenced on the 6th June, the result not yet known. Details also received of the Allied advance on the Tchernaya.—The allied force numbered 2,000, French, Sardinians and Turks. The Russians made no opposition but retreated with their guns.

Details received likewise of the capture of Kertch by an invading force numbering nearly 20,000; namely 10,000 French, 5,000 Turks and 3,500 English, in numerous steamers. Expedition entered Straits of Kertch on Thursday, the 24th May, and commenced firing upon Amblaker; the garrison of which speedily abandoned the place, having previously blown up the magazines.

Pelissier telegraphs, June 3.—That Russians have evacuated Soudejah Kertch, and themselves destroying 60 guns and 6 mortars. The entire force is concentrated at Anapa.

France.—Decree extends the free importation of Breadstuffs to the end of the present year. King of Sardinia will probably meet Queen Victoria in Paris in August, perhaps also the Sultan will be there.

Important.—Latest Lord Raglan telegraphs on the evening of the 8th, Mamelon and the White Tower were taken by the French, loss not yet known, but the utmost gallantry was displayed by all concerned.

Markets.—Cotton had advanced, but prices had again receded. Breadstuffs, little doing, and last week's prices barely maintained.
