EUROPE.

New York, December 9.

ONE DAY LATER FROM EUROPE.

The steamship Ariel arrived here at 9 o'clock this morning, having left Cowes on the morning of the 24th ult., bringing a copy of the second edition of the London Times of Saturday, the 24th.

Consols were reported 88 3-8 to 88 1-2. A letter from Karneish reports a trifling engagement at Kertch. The allies were hard pressed, and had called for reinforcements.

It was feared that Kinburn would be attacked by the Russians when the river became frozen. The place is protected by a squadron of frigates and floating batteries.

The rumoured Swedish Alliance was doubted at Berlin. The failure of the harvest in Russia was confirmed.

The U. S. Government is said to have given large orders to a Rhenish house for the delivery next spring of bullet proof cuirasses.

Antwerp is to be defended by additional forts.

The garrison of Kars had received a supply of provisions from a captured Russian convoy.

The reported malady of General Mouracoff was not confirmed.

TO RATE-PAYERS.

An Act to Authorise the Election of certain Town and Parish Officers. Passed 1st May, 1854.

Be it enacted that one or more of the following Town or Parish Officers, viz.—Weighers of Hay and Straw, Weighers of Coals, Measurers of Salt, Measurers of Wood and Bark, and Inspectors of Barrels, may be elected in the several Towns or Parishes of this Province, in the same manner, and at the same time as other Town or Parish Officers are by law authorized to be elected.

An Act relating to the Repairing of Bye Roads and Bridges in this Province. Passed 12th April, 1855.

I. The persons now by law authorized to elect certain Town or Parish Officers at the Public Meetings in the respective Parishes, held by law for the election of such officers, shall be authorized to elect and shall elect one or more person or persons, (not exceeding three) as Commissioner or Commissioners in each Parish, to expend the whole of the money granted or appropriated by the Legislature for the Bye Roads in such Parish, which person or persons so elected shall have the same power and authority, and be subject to the same duties, responsibilities, and penalties as any Commissioner of Bye Roads, heretofore appointed for the expenditure of Bye Road appropriations.

II. The person or persons so elected shall be certified and returned into the Sessions in like manner as is provided by law for other elective Parish Officers.

An Act to Regulate the Election of Members to serve in the General Assembly. Passed 12th April, 1855.

II. Three Revisors shall be annually elected or appointed for every parish in the same manner, and at the same time as other Town or Parish Officers, and subject to the like penalties.

2nd. No premium will be awarded for any article of Domestic Manufactures, Grains, Seeds or Produce of the Dairy, which has not been wholly manufactured, raised or prepared for Exhibition, within the County.

3rd. All articles to be exhibited, must have been manufactured, raised, or produced, within one year from the date of competition.

4th. That all persons desirous to exhibit any article of Domestic Manufactures, Grains, Garden Seeds or Dairy Produce, shall accompany the same with a statement setting forth that the exhibitor is the owner of the article in question. If Domestic Manufactures, that the materials were produced, and the articles manufactured, and prepared within the county during the past year. If Grains or Seed that they were raised by the exhibitor, on the premises occupied by him during the previous year, and were not exhibited for a premium, at this Society's Shows on any former occasion. And if Dairy Produce a similar statement, subscribed by the owner. These certificates to be handed to the committee, when the articles are presented for competition.

5th. That no person who has been awarded the 1st prize for any article, shall be entitled to a second prize, for the same description of article.

6th. The Judges shall not withhold any premium on the ground that the article is unworthy.

7th. All articles intended for Exhibition to be delivered into the hands of the Receiving Committee, on the morning of the Exhibition, by 9½ o'clock, and none will be admitted after 10 o'clock.

8th. No article of Grain or Seed, which has undergone any chemical, kiln, or fire-drying process, will receive a premium, or be allowed to enter for competition.
