The Northumberland Agricultural SOCIETY'S, ANNUAL EXHIBITION OF Grains, Domestic Manufactures, Dairy Produce, &c. FOR 1855-6.

The Annual Exhibition of the Northumberland Agricultural Society, will take place in the Hall of the Sons of Temperance, Chatham, on THURSDAY the 11th day of JANUARY next.

The Society has resolved to purchase the prize samples of FIELD AND GARDEN SEEDS, and to sell these at Public Auction, immediately after the prizes have been awarded.

GRAINS AND GARDEN SEEDS, (Price and Prize both included.)

Table listing various grain and garden seed samples with their respective prices and prizes. RULES AND REGULATIONS.

Rule 1st. No person who has not been a member of the Society one month prior to the day of Exhibition, shall be deemed eligible to compete for any prize offered by the Society. Rule 2nd. No premium will be awarded for any article of Domestic Manufactures, Grains, Seeds or Produce of the Dairy, which has not been wholly manufactured, raised or prepared for Exhibition, within the County. Rule 3rd. All articles to be exhibited, must have been manufactured, raised, or produced, within one year from the date of competition. Rule 4th. That all persons desirous to exhibit any article of Domestic Manufacture, Grains, Garden Seeds or Dairy Produce, shall accompany the same with a statement setting forth that the exhibitor is the owner of the article in question. Rule 5th. That no person who has been awarded the 1st prize for any article, shall be entitled to a second prize for the same description of article. Rule 6th. The Judges shall not withhold any premium on the ground that the article is unworthy. Rule 7th. All articles intended for Exhibition to be delivered into the hands of the Receiving Committee, on the morning of the Exhibition, by 9 1/2 o'clock, and none will be admitted after 10 o'clock. Rule 8th. No article of Grain or Seed, which has undergone any chemical, kiln, or fire-drying process, will receive a premium, or be allowed to enter for competition.

There are two terms per year, of 5 months each. The winter term commences 6th January, and ends 5th June. The summer term begins 22nd July, and ends 21st December. The intermediate 'Quarters' or 'Half Terms' commence 6th October and 22nd March. Pupils will also be received at intermediate periods, and charged per rata.

The French Department is under the care of Madame Florine Bringuet, who teaches on the Ollendorff system, and also gives lessons in Music.—Daily conversation in French is insisted on. Five other ladies are employed in the English Department, Music, Drawing, Italian, Botany, &c. No pains will be spared to promote the health of the boarders, by proper exercise; and these young Ladies whose parents may wish them to ride, are allowed the use of a quiet saddle horse.

There are six Pianos in the establishment, and pupils boarding in the vicinity will be charged five shillings per quarter for the use of an instrument to practice.

The Seminary is situated within a few minutes walk of four different places of Public Worship, and near to the Telegraph Station and Post Office. Amherst is a remarkably healthy part of the Country, and possesses peculiar advantages for children of delicate constitution.

Extract from the Circular of Cunard, Brett and Austin, of the 25th October, 1855.

In the year 1852 and '53, as well as the early part of 1854, the demand for Ships of 1000 tons and upwards, became so great that vessels of this class advanced to unusually high prices, while vessels from 100 to 600 tons remained comparatively low. The result has been the production in excess of large ships when estimated by the supply of small, while the demand for the latter continues good.—The models, however, of the great bulk of small vessels now in the market are exceptionable, and are not suited to the present requirements of trade. To make such more marketable, they should not in length be less than five times their width, sharp entrance, and clean run, with long flat floors; and in proportion to the increased length they should have keels, keelsons, bilges, and waterways proportionately increased in strength, so that they would combine with sailing, carrying, and light drafts, strength and fitness to take the ground if required.
