

News of the Week.

P. E. ISLAND.

Daring Outrage and Robbery.—We have just been informed of a most daring outrage and robbery committed on Douses Road, near the West River, on Friday last.

NOVA SCOTIA.

Hon. Joseph Howe took passage on Friday afternoon in the Steamship "America," for England.

Wednesday's Gazette contains the appointment of Anselm F. Comeau, late member of the Assembly for the Township of Clare, to a seat in the Legislative Council.

The Steamer America, Captain Lang, arrived at this Port on Friday afternoon, from Boston, with 270 passengers for Liverpool, and 17 for Halifax.

CANADA.

Destructive Conflagration.—A letter from Mr Gauvin, one of the residents of St. Raymond, on the River St. Anne, says, that a fire on Sunday, swept away a large portion of that settlement.

Yesterday about 200 labourers employed by the contractors for the Grand Trunk, in the neighbourhood of the village of LaChine, struck for shorter hours or higher wages.

Major-General John Home, formerly of the Grenadier Guards, has been appointed to succeed Lieut. General Rowan, in command of the troops in Canada.

Wheat was first sown in the North American Colonies in the year 1602. Not less than 150,000,000 bushels are now raised within the same limits.

Owing to the absence of rain for some weeks past, fears were entertained for the crops and the drought throughout Canada added the States was accompanied with that much dreaded attendant, conflagration in the woods.

Buffalo, June 8.—The Toronto Colonist of this morning says, we can assure our contemporaries that the seat of government will be removed, as agreed upon, without fail.

UNITED STATES.

Disgraceful.—The Collector of the port of New York is about to sell at public auction, like stray cases of goods unclaimed by their owners, many valuable articles, the property of Foreign Contributors to the Crystal Palace Exhibition.

Marriage Extraordinary.—Tom Thumb the celebrated little great man was married at Webster on Thursday last to a Miss Viaton, of Bridgeport, Ct.

Riot in Portland, Maine, and loss of Life.—Portland June 3.—About 10 o'clock last evening, a mob assembled round the building occupied as the City Liquor Agency and attempted to break in for the purpose of destroying the Liquor.

At a later hour, the mob succeeded in breaking in the door, and then the military, drawn up on the other side of the building, fired through the shop, killing one man named Ephraim Robbins, of Eastport, second mate of the bark Lola Eaton of Portland, and wounding several others—some severely.

New Orleans, May 30.—The Steamship Daniel Webster has arrived here with Californian advices received in New York by the Star of the West.

The Cholera.—The Board of Health have declared the Cholera epidemic in this city. The deaths this week have been quite numerous.

Later from California.—New Orleans, June 4.—The Steamship Promethens has arrived at this port, with dates from California to the 16th May. All the gambling saloons in San Francisco had been closed.

Tunnel Caved in.—On Wednesday morning a tunnel on the short line Cincinnati Railroad, caved in burying a dozen men who were at work. The Gazette says that six of the men were completely buried in the ruins, and five of the others were instantly killed.

NEW BRUNSWICK.

The Shediac Railway.—We hear that Mr F. Eiles, Chief Engineer of the European and North American Railway, has arrived at the Bend, but makes no sign of going on with the work.

Travels of His Excellency.—We understand that the recent visit of His Excellency to Kingston was characterized by a spirited display on the part of the inhabitants. The number that had assembled to do honour to the representative of Her Majesty was large considering the busy season of the year and the shortness of the notice.

His Excellency arrived at St. Andrews on Tuesday evening, and took lodgings at the Ashburton House. On his way thither His Excellency was presented with an Address from the inhabitants of Lancaster; and at St. Andrews another Lovee was held at the Court House at one o'clock, P. M., Wednesday.

It gives us much pleasure to learn that great exertions are in progress in the upper districts—notwithstanding the general destitution—to put in large quantities of seed; and that the grain fields are already exhibiting a most promising appearance.

WEST INDIES.

A Whirlwind.—At early dawn on Saturday morning last, a whirlwind passed over a narrow section of these Islands—its course was from S. W. to N. E. Its alarming power was most felt in the harbor of Hamilton, and in parts of Devonshire and Paget.

The whirlwind shook severely the new barque on the stocks at Hunt's Island;—shivered some of the stanchions that supported her—and lifted one of her hatches from the deck and broke it in pieces.

Latest from Havana.—Latest dates are to 15th inst. Numbers of ships of war comprising British, French, Spanish, American, and Mexican continue to hover about the coasts of Cuba.

SOUTH AMERICA.

Nicaragua.—Dates to the 24th May. The revolution in Nicaragua had assumed a warlike aspect. The contest is represented as a struggle for supremacy between republicans and monarchists, and is likely to continue with obstinate and bloody fury.
