MELANCHOLY ACCIDENT .- Mr. Thomas Robins, of Bedeque, two of his sisters, and Mis Eliza Johnston. of New Lendon, left home for a sleigh drive, down the ice to Summerside, where they spent the evening, leaving again at hall-past eight on their way home; through the darkness of the night, they lost their way, and drove out of the Harbour until they got outside the Bar, and were all plunged into an opening, twelve feet wide, and from thirty to forty yards in length, covered with snow and slightly frozen. The young man being active, and a good swimmer. young man being active, and a good swimmer, seeing one of his sisters sinking, he put his arm round her body, and with the other arm, swam to sound ice, where she held till her brother got out and assisted her also, he then lay down and reached the seat of the sleigh, that had floated off to his other sister, who caught held—when he had taken her out—nearly exhausted, he then endeavoured to rescus Eliza Johnston, who was all the time holding by the ice, at the other side of the opening, thinking the ice was stronger a thort distance round, he attempted to cross, and fell in, after recovering himself, he saw something in the water, supposing Eliza Johnston was sinking, he immediately sprang into her assistance, she was gone, he found nothing but a loose cloak. Getting out the third time, leaving the horse to his fate, he pursued his sisters, who had left, after overtaking them, he observed a light, taking that for their guide, they kept en for a short distance, when the eldest sister gave up; leaving her, he proceeded on with the other, as she was also insensible, the alarm was soon given, and from fifty to sixty men were on the ice in search of those missing, the sufferers knew not where they had been, and they could give no direction; the men parted different ways, searching the ice all night. At day light, the body of Ann Robins was found about a mile from the opening, and two miles from Summerside, and Eliza Johnston under the ice, hanging by her clothes, which kept her from sinking.
