A person who happened to be on the river at the moment, says that a very considerable undulatory motion was communicated to the ice.”

**COUNTY GLOUCESTER.**

**UNITED STATES.**

This is the plain and painful state of the case at the present hour, and therefore, at any sacrifice, by any outlet, if we be MEN, we shall assuredly never rest until we have attained here or elsewhere, to a safer, better, and nobler condition of existence.”
