Brailow, Jan. 12 .- The number of Russians who have entered the Dobrudecha is 20,000 men. 15,000 men, with 50 gans are udvancing towards Baltschik.

Endeavours to obtain an armistice.--We learn from Vienna and Berlin that great ef-forts are at this moment brought to bear to Cht in the consent of the Western Powers to an armistice. The Emperor Napoleon's ad-duess to the Imperial Guards, the reinforcements sent by England, and the treaty which France and England have concluded with Sardinia, have been regarded at Berlin and St. Petersburgh as evidences of an intention to complete the work commenced before Sabastopol, irrespective of the general professions, more or less sincere, made in the name of the Czar. The Berlin cabinet is urging with peculiar carnestness the necessity of sus with peculiar cardestness the necessity of sus-pending hostilities until the belligerents shall have pursued further the recent en-deavour to arrive at an understanding. It is believed that the recent irruption of Russian troops into the Dobrudscha was mainly intended to demonstrate to the Allies that the advantages offered by an armistice were not monopolised by Russia. It is not certain that the Austrian Government was not a party to the manoeuvre.

Affair at Balaklava .- We have received. says the Pays, a letter of the 5th from Constantinople. A column of riflemen has taken possession of the important position of Ca-mars, near Balaklava, after driving out the Russians who occupied it. The enemy in this affair experienced severe losses, they were completely put to the rout and fied precipitately, barning their forage and tents .----The loss of the Russians at Sebastopol and the neighbourhood during the last days of December is estimated at more than 5000 men

Prince Menschikoff (savs the correspond-ence of the Allgemiene Zeitung) can with difficulty feed the troops around him, and yet he incessantly demands reinforcements, more ospecially since he had ascertained with certitude, that a Turkish corps of 30,000 or 40,-000 men strong will be landed at Koslov (Eu-patoria). The Turks will play there the role performed a short time ago by Liprandi, in his position to the rear of Balaklava. As the operations of the allies were checked and hemmed in by Liprandi, so will the movements of Monschikoff be restricted and hampered. Every vulnerable point is, therefore, being looked to, and the works of defence around Perekop and Simpherol are being recommenced with vigour.

The forces which are being dispatched to Prince Menschikoff are anything but choice troops; all those that could be spared here and in Bassarabia are already in Sebastopol. If the troops already at the onset of their march have no imposing aspect, what a scene of misery must they present on arriving at their destination ? It is impossible to describe the extreme bardships over which these poor fellows must triumph. Hitherto waggons were employed in transporting them, that is now utterly impossible, as the frost has not even improved the condition of the roads. I am assured that above 10 per cent. of the explditions sink on the road from hunger and exhaustion, never again to rise; and that of those who are happy enough to arrive a large portion are received into the
