

PORT OF QUEBEC.

THE following extracts are taken from Forsyth, Bell & Co's. Prices Current, dated at Quebec, on the 25th June:

"By reference to our comparative statement of arrivals, it will be seen that there is a very large deficiency in our tonnage this season, but within the last few days we had a good number of ships dropping in, which has taken away much of the extreme depression that was felt in the latter part of the last and the beginning of the present month, and sales to some extent are now daily making. The improved state of Commercial matters in England, in consequence of the abundance of money and the recent victories of the allied armies, has tended to impart more buoyancy to the whole American Continent, and although the improvement may be gradual, we think the worst is over, and if the harvest is as good as present appearances warrant, we anticipate a more healthy feeling for our summer and fall business.

"White Pine has arrived in limited quantity, especially for really good timber, and as much of the old stock has been shipped, we think the demand will be fair, especially for superior lots. A good many rafts have been sold at our quotations.

"Deals, Floated are in limited demand, and unless the London Market improves, we think there will be great difficulty in making sales in quantity.

"Good specifications of Bright Pine have been sold at £12 for 1st, £8 for 2nds and £5 for 3rds, but inferior have been placed at less.

"Spruce may be quoted at £7 for 1st, £5 10s for 2nds, and £4 for 3rds, at which sales have been made."

The papers give a comparative statement of arrivals at the port, to 23rd June, in the years 1854 and 1855. Last year they amounted to 500 vessels of 229,034 tons; this year 207 vessels, of 108,000 tons, shewing a decrease this year in freights, of 293 tons, and in tonnage, of 121,034.

MELANCHOLY CIRCUMSTANCE.

AN Inquest was held at Chatham, before M. Cranney, Esq., Coroner, on Wednesday, the 4th inst., on view of the body of the Widow QUILTY, who came to her death under the following painful circumstances. The deceased while in the act of chastising her daughter for some supposed want of respect, took up a piece of wood to strike her, and the latter in defending herself from the blow, gave her mother a push, which caused her to fall on an old rocking chair, that had broken and sharp spokes, one of which penetrated the lower part of the body to the extent of nine or ten inches, causing her death in an hour or two after receiving the injury.

Verdict.—Accidental death by deceased falling on the broken-spoke of a rocking chair.

THE FLOUR MARKET.

As might have been expected, the favourable reports that are being constantly received of the growing crops, begins to tell on the Flour market, and the price of that necessary article which has so long been held at an enormous figure, is rapidly declining. There is ample room for further reductions.

New York, June 27.—Flour, common, \$8 12 1/2 cents to \$8 6 1/2 cents.

BERMUDA.

AN arrival from this Island at New York, brings dates to the 18th June. On the night of the 13th, one of the Government Stores was completely destroyed by fire, and the loss is estimated at £16,000.

BY TELEGRAPH.

TO MIRAMICHI GLEANER OFFICE. St. John, July 5.

America arrived at Halifax on July 4, at 10 minutes past 1 o'clock, P. M.

Sebastopol.—Lord Raglan's despatch and the newspapers correspondence are to hand, describing the gallant capture of the Mamelon and the Quarries.

Defeat of the Allies, terrible slaughter. The besiegers have made an unsuccessful attempt to storm Sebastopol. English loss is set down at 4,000. Lord Panmure regrets to have to announce that he has received information that the English troops attacked the Redan, and the French the Malakoff tower, on the 17th instant, without the success which has hitherto attended our efforts, both the French and English have suffered severely.

Moniteur announces that the Government has received two despatches from General Pelissier, the first dated the 17th, informs of operations concerted between the General and Allies, and that Turks and Chasseurs made a reconnaissance towards Aitgor, Bosquet occupying the Tchernaya, the next day at daylight the French and English were to attack the Malakoff tower, Redan, and other batteries.

Second Despatch.—20th, Announces that the attack had failed, and that although the troops had showed the greatest ardour, and had a footing in the Malakoff Tower, General Pelissier was obliged to order their retreat into the parapet, which was effected with order, and without being molested by the enemy.

Private accounts published in London say—The loss of the British Officers, killed and wounded, amounts to not less than 70: Among the killed are Sir John Campbell, Colonel Yea, and Colonel Shadforth.

The slaughter on all sides is immense, and if information is correct, the loss in killed and wounded, in British alone, amounts to little short of 4,000 men; the greater portion of the loss was experienced in a ravine, where a powerful and unexpected battery opened on the troops.

Allies also lost terribly by Russians springing a mine.

An expedition against Perekop has been undertaken.

Camp healthy, except Balaklava, where cholera prevails; Sardinians suffering, General Marmora, the younger, is dead.

Halil Pasha remains in office.

National monument is to be erected to English at Scutari.

France—Senate and Legislature are convoked for July 2, to negotiate a new loan of 100,000,000 dollars. Napoleon had been ill two days; French funds fell two per cent on announcement of his illness; he had recovered.

Russian account of the Allied successes in the sea of Azoff, is confirmed.

Austrian Commander has proclaimed martial law in Moldavia, but Moldavian authorities refuse to promulgate the order unless authorised by the Sultan.

Admiral Bayne's squadron of 17 steamers has left Kiel for the Baltic. Rest of the fleet lay off Seaker Island.

Infernal machine exploded under English steamers Merlin and Firefly, off Cronstadt on the 9th, damaging them, but not seriously.

Germany—An Austrian despatch dated the 12th, purposes to Prussia that Prussia and Austria should come to an understanding as to a common course of conduct to be adopted by the two powers, in their communication with the Diet of Frankfort.

Austrian army is being disbanded. Reduction goes on rapidly.

Astrolague brings news from Constantinople, dated 16th June. There has been a slight engagement at Eupatoria since the 12th, Russians attacked, unsuccessfully, the batteries of the besiegers.

Wheat is declining at Marseilles. Liverpool Breadstuffs.—Flour no change: a decline in Indian Corn.

Money abundant, at slightly lower rates. Bullion increased to £206,000. Consols 90 1/2. Freights quiet, with little alteration.
