

were diverted, and thus prevented from falling directly in a general melee. Enough of injury, however was accomplished. The baggage car, next the engine went down, to use the expression of one who was in it, "extremely easy," without causing any serious casualty. The first and second passenger cars followed, and in these several were killed, and a great number more or less mangled.

In the third car one or two were killed, only. This car although in a dangerous position and almost entirely demolished, was less fatal to life and limb. In the fourth and fifth cars a great many were fatally injured, and several instantly killed. The balance of the train followed swiftly on their fatal errand, and the loss of life, with contusions, more or less severe, was dreadful.

Some of the cars plunged on those beneath them with their ponderous wheels, and crushed or maimed the unfortunate persons below. Others hung upon the the cliff in a perpendicular position, and two or three turned bottom upward down the grade. Only one—the extreme rear car—maintained its position on the rail.—St Louis Republican, Nov. 2.

The Clayton and Bulwer Treaty.—The Washington correspondent of the New York Courier and Enquirer states that official advices of much importance were brought from Mr. Buchanan, by the last steamer.

Lord Palmerston, after two years of solicitation for a decision, has at length explicitly declared, that Her Majesty's Government will not conform to the American construction of the Clayton and Bulwer treaty, will not abandon the new Colony of the Bay of Islands, will not relinquish the old boundaries of the Central American Republic, as those intended by the treaty, and will not relinquish the protectorate of the Musquito Indians.

The Clayton and Bulwer treaty is therefore repudiated by both Governments and no longer exists. This unexpected change in the relations of the United States towards Central America, will lead to the most important political results.

The enterprises of Walker and Kinney will soon bring up the question of annexation, in a form which cannot be evaded. Two separate propositions for the annexation of a portion of these States have already been made to the present Administration, the solid obstacle to the acceptance of which was the Clayton treaty.

No additional troops have been ordered to Texas, but the War Department has signified its approval of Gen. Smith's plan of moving the troops already there nearer the frontier, to repress Texan incursions into Mexico, preparations for which have been progressing on a much larger scale than is generally supposed.

WEST INDIES.

From Kingston, Jamaica, we have files to the 20th of Oct. The people of the West India Islands were daily taken up with rejoicings at the fall of Sebastopol. A low marsh fever prevailed severely at Falmouth. Missionary meetings had been held in different localities with success. An Attorney General and President of the Jamaica Legislature had been appointed. The town and harbor of Montego Bay had been visited by a dreadful thunder storm. The planters of Trinidad had neglected the emigrant laborers most heartlessly, and the executive had to interfere. The negro soldiers stationed in Saint Andrews had made another attack on the people.

From a correspondent at Porto Cabello, writing on the 18th ult., we learn that cholera of a most destructive character was raging, and that gloom and desolation prevailed throughout the place. Business was completely paralyzed, not only in Porto Cabello, but in Caracas, Valencia, and through the provinces. The stock of coffee on hand was light, and none coming in from the interior. Political affairs were dull.

NOVA SCOTIA.

There was an immense haul of Mackerel round the shores of Halifax, on Wednesday evening last. In a seine set in front of Pine Hill, the residence of James Fenerty, Esq., no less than 800 Barrels were taken; and great activity prevails all along the shores of the North West Arm, in curing these welcome strangers. *Halifax Recorder.*

NEW BRUNSWICK.

We are pleased to be able to state, that a letter has been received by the Rev. Mr. Henderson of Miramichi, from the Secretary of the Colonial Committee of the Church of Scotland, in Edinburgh intimating that the said committee have agreed to give £50 stg., in aid of building a Presbyterian Church in Moncton, and that the Rev. William Murray, a missionary lately appointed, is now on his way to this place.

Mr. Henderson is authorized to draw for the money, and Mr. Murray may be expected by next mail.—*Westmorland Times.*

Extract from the Circular of Cunard, Brett and Austin, of the 25th October, 1855.

In the year 1852 and '53, as well as the early part of 1854, the demand for Ships of 1000 tons and upwards, became so great that vessels of this class advanced to unusually high prices, while vessels from 100 to 600 tons remained comparatively low.

The result has been the production in excess of large ships when estimated by the supply of small, while the demand for the latter continues good.—The models, however, of the great bulk of small vessels now in the market are exceptional, and are not suited to the present requirements of trade. To make such more marketable, they should not in length be less than five times their width, sharp entrance, and clean run, with long flat floors; and in proportion to the increased length they should have keels, keelsons, bilges, and waterways proportionately increased in strength, so that they would combine with sailing, carrying, and light draught, strength and fitness to take the ground if required.
