On motion of Mr M'Phelim, whereas the sum of fifteen hundred pounds, or thereabouts, the amount expended upon the Province Buildings and Government House the past year, is far greater than any necessity that existed for such expenditure, therefore Resolved, that this House will not hereafter make any provision for such purpose in any one year than the sum of five hundred pounds. And upon the question for adopting the resolution, the House divided as follows:—Yeas 8. Nays 10.—Whereupon it was decided in the negative.
Mr M'Phelim, from the committee on the part of this House, to join the committee of the Legislative Council, to wait upon His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor with the address of the 11th instant, relative to a Steamer to ply between Shediac and Prince Edward Island, reported—That they had attended thereto, and His Excellency was pleased to reply, "The Lieutenant Governor will carry into effect the wishes of the Legislative Council and House of Assembly."
Mr M'Phelim, also from the committee on the part of this House, to join the committee of the Legislative Council, to wait upon His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor with the address of the 11th instant, in reference to the Grand Falls Railroad, reported—That they had attended thereto, and His Excellency was pleased to reply, "The Lieutenant Governor will have much pleasure in complying with the wishes of the Legislative Council and House of Assembly."

News of the Week.

EUROPE.

Turkey.—The Sultan had ordered new recruitments in Syria.
All the allied ships of war have been recalled to the Crimea.
The death of Prince Menschikoff, from gangrene in the leg, the effect of and old wound, at Perekop, on the 17th, is confirmed.
Asiatic Turkey.—General Williams, who is investigating the disorder of the army of Asia, and of the staff, has made a report to government. Several colonels are said to have been guilty of undue severity. There has been a general conflict of authority and want of discipline.
The Governor of Mossoul has retaken the town of Zabo, and is fast assembling forces for an expedition against the Kurds.
The anticipated Visit of the Empress of the French to Constantinople.—The severe etiquette of the Sultans, which has already received more than one rude shock since the commencement of the present war, is destined it seems to experience one still more startling. Abdul-Medjid (says a letter published in the Gazette du Midi) has made up his mind to offer his arm to the Empress of the French when she arrives before the Palace of Baltaliman; to present her to the first Sultanes (there are seven who bear this title, and who take rank according to the order of the birth of their children), whose face will be unveiled! Four young ladies, chosen from the Armenian families, and speaking the French and Turkish languages, will also be placed at the disposal of the Empress as interpreters and ladies of honour. Magnificent presents—among them a side saddle adorned with precious stones—will also be offered by the Sultan to the acceptance of her imperial Majesty.

P. E. ISLAND.

The Mails.—We are happy to inform our readers, that the Government have entered into a Contract with Wm. Heard, Esq., for the conveyance of the Mails in the Steamer Rosebud twice a week, between this port and Pictou and that she will leave on her first trip on Wednesday morning. We were at one time afraid that the Government were not going to employ the Rose Bud, and that we should have a Steamer put on the route owned elsewhere, or perhaps none at all.
The Rosebud will leave on Tuesday morning at 7 o'clock for Wallace, to return the same day.—Hazard's Gazette.

NEW BRUNSWICK.

Emigration.—The Packet ship Middleton,

Delaney, master, arrived at the Quarantine station last Saturday, from Liverpool, with 110 passengers, thus classed:—steerage, 31 male adults, 32 female adults, 18 boys and 17 girls under 14 years of age, and three infants. In the cabin, eight males and two females. This is the first passenger vessel of the season. Eleven of the passengers and one seaman have typhus fever; six of the cases are considered dangerous. Under the direction of the new Board of Health all the passengers, were landed at Patridge Island on Sunday, and the ship came into port yesterday. One of the passengers, named Michael Dawson, aged 28 years, threw himself overboard and was drowned on the 17th instant, while in a state of delirium, arising from the fever.

No doubt every precaution will be taken by the new Board to prevent the introduction of this dangerous disease into the City.—New Brunswick.

Missing Vessel.—The Clipper Ship Alice, Captain Clarence De Wolf, 399 tons, sailed from this port on the 17th of February last for Liverpool, and by the latest accounts from that port she is not reported as having arrived. As she was a remarkably long and sharp built vessel, and likely to make a very good passage, it is generally feared that some accident has befallen her. She was loaded with deals, and had about seventy tons of ballast. Messrs. Gilbert and Company are the owners and Mr. John Thompson was the builder. The master was quite a young man, and much esteemed by a number of highly respectable families in this city, by whom he was well known.—Courier.

UNITED STATES.

A bloody riot had occurred at Chicago on Saturday, growing out of the excitement caused by the action of coercionists. Four men were killed and five or six others dangerously wounded. The tumult continued until night-fall when the military and police restored order. Throughout N. York, Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Illinois and half a dozen other States, the liquor question is creating an intensely bitter feeling, and popular outbreaks similar to that alluded to, are apprehended, as the natural and inevitable consequence of the attempted enforcement of sumptuary laws.

Expedition to the Plains.—Active preparations are making for this expedition, and the troops are put en route as rapidly as possible. Two companies left about the middle of the week, and a much larger force will leave to-day or Monday next. The whole army will be ready to march from Fort Lavenworth before the grass is sufficiently high for forage for the animals attached to the expedition. Something of the extent of the expenditure may be inferred from the fact, that 5,000 barrels of flour, at \$12 per barrel, make one of the items of the account of purchases. It is to be put up in sacks.—St. Louis Republic. Ap. 14.

Commodore M'Cauley's Orders.—Will there be War.—They who imagine that Commodore M'Cauley has been sent to Cuba on another Greytown expedition are very much mistaken. One of our Wall Street contemporaries, with the air of an outsider speaking by authority, says:—

The orders that have been given to Capt. M'Cauley are of the most explicit and prudent character. He is not authorized to make any demands upon the Cuban Government, nor to ask for any explanation with reference to the past; and even if he shall hear (not having himself witnessed the fact) that a vessel of the United States has been fired into, his instructions do not allow him to resent the affront, nor to take any notice of it whatsoever. It is his duty, however to use indefatigable vigilance in protecting American commerce, and, if possible, to prevent any outrage from occurring under his immediate observation. A higher bounty than has ever been paid in our Navy is offered to seamen, in order that Captain M'Cauley's squadron may be reinforced as rapidly as possible; but only in the case that a vessel under his command shall witness an attack upon one of our merchantmen, is he at liberty to resent it.

If so wanton and gratuitous an insult to this country should be offered, as firing upon an unarmed vessel of the United States in presence of our men-of-war, Capt. M'Cauley is instructed to chastise, and, if possible, to sink the aggressor, no matter what disparity of force may exist against him, what armed witness favorable to Spain may be present, or what the risk to himself may be.
