TO MIRAMICHI GLEANER OFFICE.

St. John, July 15.

The Steamer Argo arrived at New York this morning, bringing dates to the 4th July. Lord Raglan died on the 28th June, and is succeeded by General Simpson.

Nothing of importance from the Crimea.

St. John, July 18.

Canada arrived at Halifax this morning.

Lord Raglan buried with all the honours.

Nothing important or decisive from the Crimea. Allies strengthening their positions, and Russian general has sent for reinforcements of 24,000 men.

Attack on the 18th June and repulse was owing to the French division having attacked on the right before others took up their ground.

General Eyre, with 2,000 men, took possession of the suburbs of Sebastopol, and held his position seventeen hours, but not being supported, had to retire.

French Letters of June 23, say—that the army is full of confidence.

Mr Stew, Commissioner of London Times Fund, died a victim to official inhumanity.

Iron Steamer Persia, 2,600 tons for Cunard line, was launched in the Clyde.

Lord Grosvenor's bill to abolish Sunday's Trading, was withdrawn, after causing riots.

Peterson, Secretary of the Russian Legation, was recognised on board of English steamer at Southampton.

Lord Elgin to be Post Master General.

King of Prussia recovering.

Rumours respecting Revolution in Russia, without foundation.

Cotton dull, large sales.

Breadstuffs quiet, tending downward.
