Be it enacted by the Governor, Council and Assembly as follows

"I After the first day of May next, it shall not be lawful to run any Circular Saw without having a cover let down over it by the aid of hinges or otherwise, so low as to prevent persons from falling thereon, but not so near the Saw as to prevent the free working thereof, under a penalty of two pounds for each offence, besides being liable for any damage that may be sustained by any person in consequence of such omission."
