St. John, March 15.

Pacific arrived at New York yesterday morning, with dates to the 23rd ult.

The affairs of Sebastopol remain unchanged.

Mr. Raebuck's motion of enquiry into the war, carried.

Messrs. Gladstone, Herbert, and Graham, have resigned.

A battle had taken place between the Turks under Omer Pacha and a Russian force under General Leprandi. The Russians were repulsed.

Lord John Russell has been appointed Colonial Secretary. Lord Raglan reported to have resigned. Lord Lucan has been recalled.

Affairs before Sebastopol unchanged.

Markets—Cotton quiet, some description lower. Breadstuffs slightly declined.

Consuls unchanged.

St. John, March 16.

The steamer Africa arrived at Halifax yesterday, at 1 o'clock, P. M.

Halifax, March 15.—The Sarah Sands arrived on the 28th ult.

Sea of War, Feb 13.—Sortie during the night, not formidable, only 5 French killed. On the 14th, another night sortie—French lost 35 men.

On the 17th, official details of the Battle of Eupatoria. Admiral Bruat telegraphed the following:—"Monterbelle, Kamiset, Feb. 20.—On the 17th February, the town of Eupatoria was attacked on the eastern side, with 80 pieces of artillery, 68th regiment of cavalry, under General Korff, 12 regiments of infantry, about 25,000 men, under General Osten Sacken. Combat lasted from half-past 5 to 10 o'clock in the morning. The Russians were vigorously repulsed, their loss estimated at 500 killed and wounded in proportion. The Turks had 88 killed, and 289 wounded, and lost 70 horses. Selim Pacha, general of the Egyptian Division, and Colonel Rusem Bey, were killed. 18 French killed or wounded on shipboard. The attack has not been renewed by the Russians. The Steamers at anchor in roadstead contributed energetically to the defence of the town. Admiral Lyons and Bruat had sent steamers to Eupatoria.

Second Despatch.—"Eupatoria, Feb. 21—Since the affray, the Russians have not made any attempt on Eupatoria. To-day columns of infantry, and trains of cavalry, were seen leaving the town, and taking the direction of Simpheropol. Many villages still in flames in the neighbourhood of Eupatoria. More guns have been landed, and additional fortifications thrown up. The town is in good state of defence.

German papers mention the capture by Russians, of the Schesquaikapon, Schymal's strongest fortress.

Tefik Pacha, Omar Pacha's son-in-law, is dead. He died of fever at Eupatoria.

Britain.—Earl of Carlyle, is appointed Lord Lieutenant of Ireland. Rest of Ministry as announced by Pacific. Parliamentary proceedings were unimportant. Wednesday, 21st March, is appointed a National Fast for success of War.

Belgium.—Lord John Russell had an interview with King Leopold on his way to Berlin.

China.—Intelligence from China important. Dates from Hong Kong—Insurgents held Canton in a state of siege, and have command of the whole river, their fleet having gained several victories over the Imperial fleet, consequently supplies being checked. Provisions especially rice, are rising rapidly. A fight took place at Wampoa anchorage, in presence of English and American ships of war, and foreign shipping were considerably damaged by the guns of the belligerents.—English and American Commissioners have drawn a line round the factories and notified that no hostilities will be permitted within.

Shanghai dates of the 10th are important. Difficulty occurred between the Insurgent authorities at Shanghai and the French, whereupon Admiral Lagore, with Ships Jean d'Aore and Col. Best, bombarded the City, which ere this has probably surrendered or been stormed.

London—Friday night, March 2.—This evening in the House of Lords, Lord Clarendon rose and said—My Lords, I think it my duty to communicate to your Lordships the contents of a telegraphic despatch which I received half-an-hour ago from her Majesty's Minister at the Hague, that the EMPEROR NICHOLAS DIED this morning, at one o'clock, of Pulmonary apoplexy, after an attack of influenza. I have also received a despatch from Her Majesty's Minister at Berlin, that the Emperor of Russia died this morning at 12 o'clock. An hour before this despatch

I received accounts from Lord John Russell, at Berlin, stating that the Emperor was at the point of death, and had already taken leave of his family. Although these events occurred so short time ago, as between 12 and 1 o'clock this morning, there can be no doubt, under these circumstances, of the authenticity of it.

TO THE READING ROOM.

The following Legislative news has been received at the Reading Room during the week.

Fredericton, March 12.

The House to-day passed a bill to increase the Capital of the Bank of New Brunswick. They next debated and reported progress on a bill to regulate the statute labour. Hon. Mr Smith brought in a bill for the payment of Jurors, and 100 copies were ordered to be printed. The chairman of the committee having under consideration the reports of the respective sheriffs, brought in his report from which it appears that with the exception of Queen's and Carleton, the accounts had all been received, these were referred to supply. During the rest of the day the House has been in supply.

March 13.

The house has been occupied in supply all the day, and some small grants have been rejected. Hon. Mr Smith on a question from Cutler stated that the information on Railway matters would shortly be finished. A grant of £2000, for repairing roads and bridges destroyed last fall has been agreed to. A grant to Mr Neville for education of Indians in York County, was passed, after several divisions the blank filled with £50. The grant to Mr Sears for copper imported by him was lost in division of 8 to 19, in the Legislative Council, they have passed all the appropriations of the 7th and 6th inst.

March 14.

After the transaction of some routine of business, the House proceeded at 12 o'clock, to ballot for members to serve on the Carleton scrutiny, but on making the trial it was found that it could not be proceeded with, as only six unengaged members could be found; the scrutiny committee requiring 11, the trial will be made again to-morrow morning. A number of the members afterwards went up to hear the debate on the Election bill, in the Legislative Council, where the Hon. Messrs. Harrison, Steves-Botsford and Kinnear, spoke at considerable length, and with a degree of excitement not often exhibited in the Council. The bill will probably be debated for 2 or 3 days, after which it will likely pass without any important amendment.

March 16.

Progress after a long discussion, reported this morning on a bill brought by Mr Harding regarding the Corporation debentures in St. John. Progress also reported on a bill for appointing a Portwarden at Indian town. At three o'clock resolution of increasing salaries of Tidewaiters in St. John, withdrawn. House in supply. Amendment brought by the Hon. Mr Botsford on the Election Bill, lost in the Legislative Council on equal division and bill agreed to: contents on amendment Hon. Messrs. President, Botsford, Hatch, Peters, Hazen, Harrison, Davidson, Odell, and Gordon. For the bill Hon. Messrs. Saunders, Kinnear, Minchin, Hill, Wark, Stoves, Ryan, Todd and Seely. The bill on tenders introduced by Mr End, is not for legalising monies as stated in a former report, that being the law already but to prevent costs after a previous confession of judgment has been tendered to amount of the verdict afterwards returned in Court.

POSTSCRIPT.

Half-past 11 o'clock.

The Southern Mail has just arrived. We have given our papers a hasty glance, but do not see any thing in them of special importance. We copy a paragraph below:

The New York Herald, says that by the last mail President Pierce has received an autograph letter from the Czar, inviting the United States to form an alliance offensive and defensive with Russia, and accompanying it a letter from the Russian Secretary of State, disclosing the particulars of a conspiracy of the European Power against the United States, which are to be weakened by troubles fomented in various quarters and eventually attacked. Austria the Herald says, is still really the friend of Russia and it was from that power the information now communicated to the Washington Cabinet was received.

Cuba is to be preserved for Spain at all hazards. It is added that the President will probably apply to Congress in a special session for an appropriation of ten millions in consequence of having received this information.

MARKET REGULATIONS.

At a General Session of the Peace, of our Lady the Queen, held at the Court House, Newcastle, in and for the County of Northumberland, on Tuesday the 9th day of January, in the year of our Lord One Thousand Eight Hundred and Fifty Five.

Ordered, That the following Rules and Regulations, be made and established in pursuance of the authority vested in the General Sessions by the revised Statutes, Part I, Title 8, Cap 64, "for the establishment and regulation of Markets, Market Houses and Fairs, and for the slaughtering of animals and the sale of dead meats."

I. That there be a Public Market kept in the Public Square, below St. Mary's Church, in the Town of Chatham, on Tuesdays and Saturdays, in each week throughout the year.

II. That the Market hours be from 11th May to the 1st October, from 6 o'clock, A. M., to 3, P. M., and from 1st October to 11th May, from 7 o'clock, A. M., to 2, P. M., after Market hours anything remaining unsold, may be sold as if these regulations had not been made.

III. That all kinds of fresh beef, pork, veal, mutton, lamb, meats poultry and fowls, of all kinds, butter, cheese, eggs, fruit and vegetables of every description, raised in the country, be sold on Market days only, in the Market place, in the Town of Chatham, during Market hours. Penalty of one Pound for each violation of this Regulation.

IV. To prevent fore-stalling, no one person shall be allowed to purchase on any one day in the Market, more than one quarter of beef, one side of mutton, lamb, veal, pork, or other fresh meat, six fowls, two geese, two turkeys, two ducks, two wild fowls, six rabbits, four dozen of eggs, six pounds of fresh butter or one cheese, nor more than one crock, tub or keg of salt butter, two barrels of turnips or old potatoes, one dozen of cabbage or cauliflower, or more than half a bushel of new potatoes, pease, beans, carrots, leats, parsnips, cucumbers, pepper pods, or more than 2s. 6d. worth of herbs, pumpkins, squash, onions, leeks, lettuce, radish, cranberries, strawberries, gooseberries, currants, apples, pears, plums, damsons, raspberries blueberries, under a penalty of one Pound for each violation of this regulation.

V. No ale, porter, wine, or spirituous liquor of any kind, shall be exposed for sale, or used within the Market limits at Market hours, under a penalty of one pound for each violation of this regulation.

VI. No person or persons, shall sell or offer for sale, any putrid or unwholesome meat or article of food, under a penalty of five pounds for each violation of this regulation, and all such putrid and unwholesome article, to be forfeited and destroyed by the proper officer.

VII. No person or persons, shall place any obstruction on the Market place or ground, under a penalty of twenty shillings, for each violation of this regulation.

VIII. No articles whatever, which have been sold in the Market, shall be resold there on the same day, under the penalty of one pound, for each violation of this regulation.

IX. No person attending the Market shall buy and sell otherwise than for money, or use other than the proper weights and measures, under a penalty of one pound for each violation of this regulation.

X. That it shall be the duty of the Clerk of the Market, (or such other persons may be appointed for that purpose,) to enforce these regulations and proceed against offenders for breaches or violations of the same.

XI. The Clerk of the Market, shall be entitled to receive for his services, such sum as the Sessions may order or determine, not exceeding twenty pounds per annum, which, salary shall be borne by the said parish.

XII. The penalties recovered and collected under these regulations, shall be paid to the Clerk of the Market, to be applied towards defraying necessary expenses and other purposes of the Market, and he shall account to the Sessions, annually, at the January Term, for all monies so received and expended.

FISH MARKET.

I. That a Public fish market be held at the Public Slip, at the foot of King Street, in the Town of Chatham, between the hours of 6, A. M. and 1, P. M. on every week day from the 1st day of May to the 1st day of November in each year.

II. No fresh fish shall be sold, or offered for sale or purchased during Market hours elsewhere than in the Market, under the penalty of two pounds for each violation of this regulation.

III. No person shall purchase in market any one day, more than twenty-eight pounds of any one kind of fresh fish, except where one fish weighs more than twenty-eight pounds, under the penalty of five shillings.

IV. No putrid or unwholesome fish, shall be sold or offered for sale, or purchased in the market, under the penalty of five pounds, for each violation of this regulation, and all such putrid or unwholesome fish, shall be forfeited and destroyed by the keeper of the market.

V. No fish purchased in the market shall be resold there, under a penalty of ten shillings for each violation of this regulation.

VI. It shall be the duty of the Clerk of the Market to enforce these regulations, and to proceed against offenders for all breaches or violations of these regulations.

VII. The Clerk of this Market shall be entitled to receive for his services such sum as the Sessions may order or determine, not exceeding ten pounds per annum, to be borne by the said parish.

VIII. All penalties recovered and collected, under these regulations, shall be paid to the Clerk of the Market, and be applied towards defraying the necessary expenses, and other purposes of the Market, and he shall account to the Sessions annually at the January Term, for all monies by him received or expended.
