FREDERICTON MAIL. Terrific Thunder Storm.—On Monday last thunder clouds were seen arsing from the South and shortly afterwards clouds evidently charged with electricity, were discovered rapidly ap-proaching from the North West. The clouds met just over Fredericton, and for nearly an hour the effects of the collision were terri-fic. Balls of fire seemed to roll through the fic. Balls of fire seemed to roll through the streets, and through shops where doors and windows were open. Trees trembled in every branch, and even the very ground seemed to shake, while crash upon crash drowned every human voice, each crash following quickly flashes of vivid lightning. At length a stream of fire descended directly from heaven, awfully grand, followed instantaneously by one of the most tremendous claps of thundsr it is possible to imagine. By this shock several persons in the vicinity of Fredericton were thrown off their feet, but we have not heard of any one se-riously injured.

riously injured. A house was struck in George's street, and very much shattered. The lighting seems to have struck the chimaey, carrying away ill above the roof, and several feet below the ridge pole; it then appears to have descended to the ground floor, tearing large holes through the ceiling and partitions, forcing off both plaster and lathing, and then to have escaped both front and rear.

front and rear. The shingles on both roof and walls are rip-ped off in many places: a door between two rooms in the lower story was forced out, and one of the casings torn off a brick wall, some of the rear windows had every pane of glass broken out; some of the rafters were split in-to shreds; and some of the chimney bricks were thrown across a wide street and lodged were thrown across a wide street and lodged in the burying ground opposite. Fortunately there was no person in the house at the time.
