

ence to matters of purely local and colonial character, and involving no imperial interests has, to say the least, made a most questionable use of that prerogative which in theory he enjoys, and which certainly never should be so used as to convert the sovereign or his representative, from being the chief magistrate of a nation, or an integral portion of it, into the head of a political party—the unfortunate position which, as it appears to us, is that which our Lieutenant Governor, has made his election to occupy. If, on the other hand, responsible government, so called, is to be so conducted as to recognize the right of the crown to contribute to the triumph of one political party or the defeat of another, then we are free to confess that we are not greatly enamoured of its provisions, and that we should earnestly desire to enjoy the right of citizenship under some other form of political regimen. \* \* \*

“He dissolved the House of Assembly not only without, but in direct opposition to the advice of the parties which the constitution had placed around him as his sole advisers, and then having thus acted, he goes a begging for an *ex post facto* approval of this most arbitrary act! This procedure we can by no means approve, nor can it commend itself to men of any political creed whatsoever, who believe in, and desire to maintain, responsible government. What the Sovereign of Great Britain would not venture to attempt, her Representative in New Brunswick must not be permitted to practice with impunity. And, in order that the new House of Assembly may give no uncertain sound in this important crisis in our colonial history, the test question addressed to candidates for election of every political name should be. Will you sustain the Lieutenant Governor in dissolving the House? No consistent supporter of Responsible Government, as we take it, be his politics what they may, can possibly vote for any Representative who would answer the question in the affirmative.”

**THE DISMISSED MINISTER.**

MR CRAMPTON, late British Minister at Washington, together with the three dismissed Consuls were passengers in the mail steamer Canada, which vessel left Boston for Liverpool on the 4th instant. The citizens of Halifax presented Mr C. with an Address, to which he made a suitable reply.

The Boston Journal in speaking of the conduct pursued by the President and his Cabinet in dismissing the British Minister, makes the following sensible and dignified remarks, which appear to be an echo of the respectable portion of the Press in the Union, and as well as all classes possessing weight and respectability.

“Secretary Marcy, in his last despatch to Mr Dallas notifying him of the dismissal of Mr Crampton, says that the equivocal disclaimer by her Majesty's government of any intention either to intrude the law or disregard the policy, or not to respect the sovereign rights of the United States, and their expressions of regret if contrary to their intentions and to their reiterated directions, there has been any infringement of the laws of the United States, are satisfactory to the President. The ground of complaint, so far as respects her Majesty's government, is thus removed. Our government could hardly be otherwise than satisfied with the apology received from a nation which has just emerged from a foreign war with an army and navy in the most effective condition—an apology so full, so ample, and so frank, as to leave no room to doubt the friendly feelings which inspired it. The American government could well have afforded to meet such an overture of friendship in a spirit of corresponding magnanimity and good will. It could have afforded, without any sacrifice of dignity or honor, to have overlooked the offence of the British minister and consuls, and to have given to the British government a proof of its reciprocal friendship, by withdrawing all further proceedings against them. The President has chosen a different course. He has pushed a proud and sensitive nation to the wall, creating a breach which, although it may not result in a rupture, will be a source of constant irritation which will not soon be healed.”

**EXCITING TIME.**—The times are stormy and present many exciting subjects. The American Journals are full of rumours and remarks respecting the following matters—the dismissal of the British Minister at Washington and the Consuls at New York and Cincinnati; the bloody civil war now raging at Kansas; the brutal attack on Mr Summers by Mr Brookes, a Southern Senator; and the indignation meetings held on the subject. In Nicaragua, matters appear very squally. France and Spain have both taken up imposing attitudes, that may lead to trouble with the United States. The Canadian papers inform us a new Ministry has been formed, and that Governor General Head has, like our own Governor, been exercising a little bit of prerogative—putting his veto on the bill which has just passed both branches of the Legislature, applying the elective principle to the Executive Council.—The Journals of this Province are crowded with Editorials and Communications, pro and con, respecting the conduct of His Excellency in dissolving the Assembly, which led to the disruption of the Executive Council.

**THE ELECTION.**—A very animated canvass has been going on for some days past, and the freeholders in the rural districts have been visited by a host of persons whose appearance among them is limited to occasions like the present. They no doubt understand and duly appreciate the honor conferred. In the streets of Chatham a large business is doing in ‘shaking of hands.’ Of one thing we trust the freeholders will make themselves acquainted with before they promise their votes—that is, does the Candidate, or does he not, justify the action of the Lieutenant Governor in dissolving the Assembly without the concurrence of his Council.

**STEAM FERRY.**—We are pleased to have it to announce, and the travelling public will be gratified to hear the intelligence, that Mr. Bell having procured from Britain a new boiler for his Steam Ferry Boat. She is now in working order. She crossed over for the first time this morning, and he informs us he is well satisfied with the boat and the machinery. Both fully meet his expectations.
