UNITED STATES.

Business in New York.—The N. Y. Herald of a recent date in referring to the cold weather and the state of affairs in New York, says:—

Our Harbor and the North and East rivers are filled with huge masses of floating ice. Navigation for sailing vessels is suspended, the Sound steamers are laid up, and it is only the powerful steamtugs and strongly built ferry boats that keep open communication with the ocean and the shores of Long Island and New Jersey. The condition of the rivers, combined with the wretched state of our streets, has a very depressing effect upon business. The Atlantic docks, at Brooklyn, our principal bread-stuffs depot, are so frozen in as to make delivery of merchandize from them in a measure impossible; and as large quantities of grain and flour are held there on storage, sales for speedy shipment are impracticable. Vessels arriving with cargoes from Southern ports find it very difficult and expensive to discharge them. The receipts by the railroads, though light, must be carted to vessels, if moved at all, at a heavy expense, as the streets, from the debris of the late snow storm, are rendered almost impassable, and as high as two cents per bushel has been paid for carting grain from the Erie and Hudson River railroad depots across the town from the North to the East river. From this state of things, to say nothing of the dangers attending pedestrian exercise over our ice-covered pavements, we pray for a deliverance as speedy as the economy and capriciousness of nature in this latitude will permit.

Let these who talk so much in favour of war with England read the following:—

The Mobile Reporter says that no less than one hundred and eighty ships and barks are at this time loading in the Southern ports for foreign parts, one hundred of which are for Great Britain.

Miss Murray's New Book in Defence of Slavery in the United States.—The N. Y. Evening Post states that the Queen would not see her maid of honor, Miss Murray, upon her return from the United States, and signified to her that if she published a defence of slavery she must resign her place. Miss Murray has done so, and is no longer a member of the royal household.

PUBLIC NOTICE.

The following BILL will be brought before the Legislature at the approaching Session, and is now published for the information of all concerned. A Bill to amend Title one, Chapter one, of the Revised Statutes, "of the Division of the Province into Counties and Parishes."

Whereas, by the Revised Statutes the Division Line between the Parishes of North Esk and Nelson in the County of Northumberland, is established by a line running West from Beaubear's Point, thereby altering the boundary of the said Parishes as by Law heretofore established; which has led to confusion and inconvenience to the inhabitants generally of both parishes, and most seriously injure the Parish of North Esk. And whereas, it appears to have been a mistake in the compilation, and it is deemed advisable that that part of the said chapter be repealed, and the old line re-established. Be it therefore Enacted by the Lieutenant Governor, Legislative Council, and Assembly, That, that part of the said Chapter, Number One, Title Number One, as relates to the division line between the Parishes of Nelson and North Esk, in the County of Northumberland, be, and the same is hereby repealed, and in lieu thereof, that the said division line shall commence from Beaubear's Point and run South Sixty Eight degrees, West as formerly established by law.
