**PROROGATION OF HOUSE.**—This morning we obtained the Speech of His Excellency on proroguing the Legislature on Thursday last.

It will be my duty, aided by my council, to apply with economy, the funds placed at my disposal, and to exercise with prudence the donors of pledging the Provincial credit, which have been introduced by the Legislative to the Executive Government.

We shall cordially unite in an expression of joy and thankfulness for the restoration of peace. It is my sincere wish that in the various occupations to which you will now return, success may attend you, and I trust that by the favor of Providence, the industry of the people, whether agricultural or commercial, will meet with their just reward.

Miramichi Fishery Society.

AT A MEETING of the BOARD of the MIRAMICHI FISHERY SOCIETY, held at Bowser's Hotel, on Thursday, the 24th April, 1856, the following Resolutions were unanimously adopted.

WHEREAS, at the Annual Meeting of the Miramichi Fishery Society which took place on the 15th January last, a Committee of Five Members was appointed to Report on the best means to be adopted for the advancement of the objects of the Society. And Whereas, the Report of that Committee has been submitted for the consideration of the present meeting, therefore—

RESOLVED, 1st. That in the opinion of this Board the best method of stimulating the MACKEREL FISHERY and testing its practicability, at this place, will be for this Society to offer a Bounty to a Schooner, of the proper Tonnage, and well prepared, to prosecute successfully the Mackerel Fishery during the coming season.

2d. In order that the Society may be enabled to select the vessel best adapted for this purpose, Public Notice shall be given that written applications from Owners or Freighters of Vessels, who may feel disposed to employ a Schooner in the Mackerel Fishery, and avail themselves of the Society's bounty, will be received at the office of the Secretary until MONDAY, the 26th day of MAY next, at noon, it being understood that on the afternoon of MONDAY, the 2nd of JUNE at 4 o'clock, the name of the applicant most approved of by the Society, will be announced.

3d. That the Bounty for a vessel over 30 Tons be £60, or £50 if under that size. No Vessel under 25 tons will be accepted. The Vessel to be selected must belong to this County, and her cargo, or catch of Mackerel, must be landed in Chatham for inspection by the Society.

4th. The Affidavit of the Captain and Mate of the vessel, setting forth the precise period the vessel has been employed in Fishing, and the quantity of fish she has caught, together with such other details, or evidence as the Society may require, shall be proof of the right of the Owner or Freighters of the vessel to claim said Bounty.—And further—

Resolved Unanimously, That the following Gentlemen be a Committee to carry out, in behalf of the Society, the above Resolutions:—John M. Johnson, G. H. Russell, David Ritchie, W. J. Fraser, and John MacKie, Esquires.

At a General Session of the Peace of our Lady the Queen, held at the Court House, in Newcastle, in and for the County of Northumberland, on Tuesday, the Eighth day of January, in the year of our Lord, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Fifty Six.

Ordered, That Rule number Three of the Rules and Regulations of Sessions, passed at January Sessions, 1852 "For the prevention of Trespasses by Cattle, and preventing Cattle going at large," so far as the same relates to the Parish of Ludlow be and the same is hereby repealed.

At a General Session of the Peace of our Lady the Queen, held at the Court House, in Newcastle, in and for the County of Northumberland, on Tuesday, the Eighth day of January, in the Year of our Lord One Thousand Eight Hundred and Fifty Six.

Ordered, That the following Rules and Regulations be made and established by the General Sessions, by the Authority of the Revised Statutes, Part 1, Title 8, Chapter 64, "For preventing and regulating Horses, Cattle, Sheep, Swine, Goats, Dogs and Geese running at large."

I. Ordered, That no Horse, Mare, or Gelding, be allowed or suffered to go at large, or to graze or be fed on any of the Roads, Streets, or Highways at any season of the year in that part of the Parish of Hardwicke, lying between the upper boundary of the said Parish and Bay du Vin River.

II. Ordered, That all the penalties and forfeitures, imposed under, and by virtue of the Regulations passed at January Sessions 1851 "For the prevention of Trespasses by Cattle, and preventing Cattle going at large," shall be applicable to the foregoing Regulation in similar case, and shall be recovered thereunder, and all Fees imposed under, and by virtue of the said recited Regulation, shall be recovered and demanded by the Hogsreves, Pound Keepers, and Constables respectively in that part of the said Parish of Hardwicke, for carrying out this Regulation.
